and Capt John M. Honeywell the Capt took the
same Beef that they had in their keel and brought
it in the cabin to eat and cut some off of it for us
and it was as handsome meat as any body wants to see so

took some up and showed it to Robert Macy the Merchant
brought it aft and told him to taste it and he did
and finally allowed it was good enough for anybody and
said that when he cut into it that ^{thought} it smelt
was not fit to eat latter part fine rain and calm

Wednesday March 18th

Commenced with calm and light air from various quarters
course E by N all sail set cooked some more beef for the
today and the Capt asked Smith about the beef and
he said it was good enough for anybody and he was
one of the head ones to condemn it yesterday night
past rain with the wind from the Westward latter part
a gale from the S W course E by N to N under
foremast and main topsail

Thursday March 19th

Commenced with a heavy gale from the S S W course
E by N to N under double reefed Main topsail and
foremast hatches all lowered down and lashed solid
latter part strong breeze from the S W course E by N to N

Friday March 20th

Commenced with a strong breeze from the S W course
E by N to N under whole Main topsail and foremast
double reefed foremast single reefed Mizen and jib
latter part pleasant with a fine breeze from the S W
course E by N all sail set

Saturday March 21st

Pleasant with a fine breeze from the S W course E by N
all sail set studding sail below and aloft Middle part light air
and calms latter part a fine breeze from the S W course E by N
all sail set

Sunday March 22nd

Pleasant with a strong breeze from the Westward course E by N
with studding sail below and aloft hove out one bell of Beef and one of
Pork making five days since the last beef and Pork was hove out
I spoke to the Cook about it and told him the Meat had been
wasted and he said that he had not wasted any and the Men
forward said they knew very well the Meat had not been eat
and that it never came forward so the Captain told me to
weigh them out thirty pounds a day after four o'clock

Charles Ingram was to the helm and he told the Capt that
the Cook had just hove a piece of Pork overboard so that
accounts for where the Meat has gone he is ready to waste
anything that belongs to the Ship or anyone aft if the
Steward takes anything to the Galley he can't get only
part of it or if he takes a piece of soap on Deck
to wash some clothes the Cook takes it and stores it away
with the Steward speaks to him about it then the Cook
tells him to look under the cooler or under the Windlass
and he will find it so there enough there it is all safe
latter part a strong breeze from the S W course E by N
under double reefed fore and main topsail and foresail
carried away the fore topmast studding sail boom and lost
the studding sail overboard

Monday March 23rd 1857

Pleasant with a fine breeze from the S S W with all
sail set rose a new wheel rope latter part a fine
breeze from the S W course E by N all sail set

Tuesday March 24th

Commenced with a fine breeze from the S W course E by N
all sail set with rain latter part pleasant with a light
breeze from the Westward course E by N all sail set
