

Remarks On Board Ship Hobkirk
Friday Nov. the 1st 1844

The first of these 24 hours strong winds from
E & we hove-to for the whale at 4⁰⁰ AM
and the W. Boat got a whale
the middle and latter blowing heavy from the Eastward
we parted a flock chain heavy rain Lat 35-41

Saturday Nov. the 2nd 1844
The first of these 24 hours blowing heavy wind
from W. we commenced withing got in the
bow and the head partly off the middle and
latter blowing heavy from W. Lat 35-41

Sunday Nov. the 3rd 1844
The first of these 24 hours blowing heavy from
W. we hooked on to the whale and got in
one piece and not some on the head the middle
blowing heavy the head came off from the corner
ice and parted the head rope and we lost it the
latter blowing a gale from W. S. W. and a bad sea Lat 35-41
Long 125-30

Monday Nov. the 4th 1844
The first of these 24 hours blowing heavy from W. S. W.
the middle more moderate the latter strong winds
W. S. W. we finished withing and commenced hoisting
Lat 35-00 Long 125-30

Tuesday Nov. the 5th 1844
The first of these 24 hours strong winds the middle
strong we finished hoisting we saved about 40
the latter light winds the winds W. S. W. Lat 35-00
Long 125-30

Wednesday Nov. the 6th 1844
The first and middle light winds the latter calm
all hands employed stowing down oil saw fair
fine weather Lat 35-41 Long 125-30

Thursday Nov. the 7th 1844
The first of these 24 hours light winds from
S. W. we saw a whale which we called a
spoon whale being so near night we could not
tell the middle and latter calm all hands stow
down Lat 35-50 Long 125-30

Blackmouth Poland Jones Master Continued
Friday Nov. the 8th 1844

The first of these 24 hours calm we finished stowing
the middle light breezes from the Eastward the
strong winds from E the watches employed
ships duties saw fair Lat 35-50 Long 125-30

Saturday Nov. the 9th 1844
The first of these 24 hours strong winds from E
we steering W. at 6 P. M. we took in the fore
and fore and mizen topsails and close reefed
main and hauled to the wind heading to the N. W.
the middle and latter blowing heavy from
W. S. W. heading N. by W. Lat 35-41 Long 126-00

Sunday Nov. the 10th 1844
These 24 hours light winds from S. E. and fine
the saw nothing Lat 35-00 Long 126-30

Monday Nov. the 11th 1844
These 24 hours light winds and calms saw grass
fine weather the blacksmith to work
the large Lat 35-50 Long 126-30

Tuesday Nov. the 12th 1844
The first of these 24 hours light winds from the
W. S. W. at 5 P. M. we had a big ht squall
and strained the hoakes to the backs of the
boats-aidyard and carried it away and carried
away the gill boom we got in the boom
shortened sail the middle light winds from
the latter strong winds from W. S. W. W. S.
employed in making a gill boom saw
nothing Lat 35-50 Long 126-50

Wednesday Nov. the 13th 1844
The first of these 24 hours strong winds from
W. S. W. the middle and latter light winds
to work on the gill boom and spiritail
fine weather Lat 35-43

Thursday Nov. the 14th 1844
The first of these 24 hours strong wind from
the middle and latter strong winds from
the latter rain thunder and lightning
