

Remarks On Board Ship *Ho-barnock*

Tuesday Dec the 1st 1844

The first of these 24 hours light winds we beat the main
top sail the middle and latter light winds saw
nothing the wind 15° Lat $25^{\circ} 20'$

Wednesday Dec the 2nd 1844

These 24 hours strong winds from 15° saw
blackish thick cloudy weather. Lat $25^{\circ} 17'$ Long $126^{\circ} 42'$

Thursday Dec the 3rd 1844

The first of these 24 hours strong winds from
 15° the middle strong from 15° the latter light
winds from 15° the watches serving the long yard to
the fore rigging. Lat $26^{\circ} 50'$ Long $127^{\circ} 10'$

Friday Dec the 4th 1844

The first of these 24 hours strong winds from
 15° the middle light winds the latter light
winds from 15° we unbraced the fore
top sail to wind saw fairbairns Lat $25^{\circ} 20'$ Long $128^{\circ} 05'$

Saturday Dec the 5th 1844

The first of these 24 hours light winds from
 15° we beat the fore top sail the middle light
winds the latter light winds from 15° the
watches serving the long yards to the fore rigging
and painting 2 new boats over board saw not
thing fine weather. Lat $25^{\circ} 30'$ Long $129^{\circ} 17'$ Long $129^{\circ} 20'$

Sunday Dec the 6th 1844

The first part of these 24 hours calm we fin-
ished painting the boats and setting up the
fore rigging the middle and latter light winds
from 15° saw fairbairns Lat $25^{\circ} 48'$ Long $130^{\circ} 42'$

Monday Dec the 7th 1844

The first of these 24 hours light winds from the
Eastward the middle calm the latter light winds from
 15° the watches setting up the main rigging Lat $25^{\circ} 10'$ Long $131^{\circ} 17'$

Tuesday Dec the 8th 1844

The first of these 24 hours light winds from Eastward
 15° the middle strong winds from 15° heading 15° by
 15° took in top gallants the latter blowing strong from
 15° by 15° heading 15° we double reefed and took in the
standing half watches but none

Wednesday Dec the 11th 1844

The first of these 24 hours strong winds from 15°
saw the middle strong winds from 15° the
latter light winds from 15° we turned out the
lee and set top gallants steering 15° Lat $28^{\circ} 35'$

Thursday Dec the 12th 1844

The first of these 24 hours light winds from 15°
steering 15° the middle strong winds from 15° and
qually the latter strong winds from 15° steering
 15° we unbraced the fore sail and bent masts and
bent the fly gibb saw fairbairns Lat $28^{\circ} 35'$ Long $137^{\circ} 38'$

Friday Dec the 13th 1844

The first of these 24 hours strong winds and squally
we got out some more the middle strong winds
from West the latter strong winds from 15° steering
 15° by 15° Lat $22^{\circ} 27'$ Long $141^{\circ} 05'$

Saturday Dec the 14th 1844

The first and middle blowing heavy from 15° and
qually the latter blowing heavy at 4 A.M. took
in all sail except close reefed main top sail
at 9 A.M. set fore and main top sails, fore sail
and gibb steering 15° Lat $22^{\circ} 40'$ Long $143^{\circ} 21'$

Sunday Dec the 15th 1844

The first of these 24 hours strong winds from 15°
steering 15° the middle light winds from 15° steering
 15° the latter light winds from 15° we spoke
the Ship *Corinthian* of Bristol 24 months out
at 10 A.M. of it sperm we saw fairbairns Lat $29^{\circ} 46'$

Monday Dec the 16th 1844

The first of these 24 hours light winds from 15°
spoke the Brigg *Marion* of Woburn 8 miles
and the Brigg *Joanna* of Dito 11 miles
the land in sight the middle and latter
light winds from 15° at 4 A.M. we took ship
land 10 miles off saw 5 sail Lat $28^{\circ} 45'$

Tuesday Dec the 17th 1844

The first of these 24 hours light winds from 15° we saw the *Joanna* char-
acter light we spoke the Brigg of Dito 35 miles
spoke *Corinthian* the latter light winds Lat $28^{\circ} 02'$
