

Remarks On Board Ship *Hobson*
Thursday Jan the 23 1845

The first and middle light winds from S & by E
and rain the latter strong winds from S & rain
steering N & by E the watches working ship
Lat *Sandy*

Friday Jan the 24 1845

The first of these 24 hours strong winds from S & by E
steering N & by N heavy rain the middle strong
winds and rain at 4 P.M. we took in topgallensails
at 9 looked up the courses and heeled to the wind
heading E N & at 12 wore ship and double reefed
heading S W the latter strong winds from S & steering
E N & by E Lat 20-27 Long 160-

Saturday Jan the 25 1845

The first of these 24 hours light winds from S
steering N & by E at 4 P.M. we saw the land the
middle light winds from S S W at 11 we
heeled to the wind and laid with the mainyard
aback heading S at 5 P.M. kept off and
ran down to Crookings at 8 the ~~light~~ S boat
went ashore there was 1 ship lying up and we
went ashore in night Lat 21-26 Long

Sunday Jan the 26 1845

The first of these 24 hours light winds from
W S W the boat returned from the shore
and we ran round to over the place and 2
boats went ashore at 4 P.M. returned with
the fruit and baskets the middle light wind
the latter 2 boats went on shore for timber
the Board of N.W. being up on an to the
other place he was 150 into 300 Lat

Monday Jan the 27 1845

The first of these 24 hours light winds from S W
at 4 P.M. the boats returned from the shore the middle
light winds the latter light winds 2 boats went on
shore with 8 casks for water in fine weather

Tuesday Jan the 28 1845

The first of these 24 hours light winds
at 4 P.M. the boats returned with the
water and went on shore again at 7 P.M.
returned with potatoes and fruit on
the light being David Bay on the N.W.
side of Paratonga the middle light
winds from S S W steering N & by N
the latter light winds from S S W steering
N & by N the watches employed in ship
duty pointing the S boat and S boat
at fine weather Lat 21-04 Long

Wednesday Jan the 29 1845

These 24 hours light winds from S W
steering N & by N saw nothing Lat 20-27

Thursday Jan the 30 1845

These 24 hours light winds and equally
winds the crew in a swimming saw nothing
Lat 19-25 Long 156-57

Friday Jan the 31 1845

The first of these 24 hours light winds
from S heading N N W the middle light
winds from E heading N N E we had a
squall and split the gill the strong winds
were equally the watches breaking out from a
gill Lat Long

Saturday Feb the 1 1845

The first of these 24 hours light winds
from N & heading N N W we had
a gill the middle light wind from N &
by E heading S & equally the latter light
winds from E by N heading N the watches
employed in ship duty Lat 17-55 Long 157-45

Sunday Feb the 2 1845

These 24 hours light winds from E by N
heading N by E saw nothing

Lat 15-45 Long 157-35
