

Remarks On Board Ship Hobbsmarch
Sunday Feb the 8th 1846

The first of these 24 hours light
began the middle we spoke the
Elinabeth of value 14 miles out
500 whals 300 from the latter
we spoke the ship 5 ships
in sight Lat 55-15 Long 25-15

Monday Feb the 9th 1846
There 24 hours light winds and calm
we are between Redondo Beach and
the North head of a T. L. L. March
the watches employed in ships duty
ran 6 ships Lat 55-15 Long 25-15

Tuesday Feb the 10th 1846
The first of these 24 hours we spoke
the Elinabeth of value we sent
a boat to Redondo for fish
the middle and latter light
winds and calm ran 5 rail Redondo
10 ms dist Lat 55-15 Long 25-15

Wednesday Feb the 11th 1846
The first of these 24 hours light
winds and squally the middle light
winds At 9 P.M. a boat came on
board from the Gen Scott of
St. Haven 30 miles out 17000 from
the latter light winds and
4 sails and barkash.

Thursday Feb the 12th 1846
The first of these 24 hours light
winds the middle we spoke the
Borgue Swanklin of Warren had
taken nothing since we saw her
last the latter light winds
and fine weather saw 1 ship
Hobbsmarch and Ostrabough in
sight Lat 55-15 Long 25-15

Falmouth Roland St George's Neck
Wednesday Feb the 13th 1846

The first of these 24 hours light
winds we towed for two whals
at 1 P.M. the Starboard Boat struck
at 3 the Starboard struck at
5 we took the whals along side
saw plenty of whals L. Boat
the middle we commenced boiling
the latter we commenced cutting
saw 1 ship Flood G. L. being with
us no ms

Thursday Feb the 14th 1846
These 24 hours light winds we
finished cutting on blackfish and
L. boat and 2 ships the land
in sight Lat 55-15 Long 25-15

Friday Feb the 15th 1846
The first of these 24 hours we
spoke the Norman of N. York 2 miles
out 3500 from 150 whals the
middle and latter fine weather
the watches employed in boiling
saw fine weather Lat 55-15 Long 25-15

Saturday Feb the 16th 1846
The first of these 24 hours light
winds we spoke the Norman in
middle fine weather the latter
light winds we finished boiling
the Norman in sight
Lat 55-15 Long 25-15

Sunday Feb the 17th 1846
These 24 hours light winds
saw 6 S. O. heading S by W
fine weather
