Wednesday  
16<sup>th</sup> of Sept  
Obs 26° W

These 24 hours Commences with light Breezes from the S. E. & pleasant weather two Sails in Sight at 4 30 P.M. our Ship went visible to the Eye, the Main at the rate of 2 miles per hour nothing is visible to the Eye all around as far as we the Eye could extend nothing but a very wide ocean could behold smooth & calm the sea heaven seems to blend with a pleasant time for a swim the Order was given & the main Jib sail was hove to the Mast Stan by my Lads over Board every one that can swim saw they plunge from the ships side in to the Ocean blue & Deep quickly to the top of the water they rise & ever see our selves in this way about a half an our jump in my lads was the ward swing round the main yard fore & aft now she gets away slowly through the water again all the rest of these 24 hours light Winds & a few light Showers of rain Ends with fine weather the watch employed in Ships Duty 3 men still unable to do duty turned the Boat over & painted her & sail in Sight our Course about S. E. C.

Commences with light Winds from the S & W & passing Clouds a Schooner of our Sea Beam at 4 30 P.M. lowered away all 4 boats on a practising Excursion set sail & pulled about 2 or 3 miles ahead the ship & practiced garting a little & pulled along side again hoisted them up & saw our ship slip slowly along through the waves the yards brast sharp to the wind fore & main Jack well aboard the Bowline bearing a good strain I feel anxious for a fair & pleasant gill to start us quickly along to the whaling ground at 7 the wind halled with a heavy Shower the light sails now the masts through it about 8 of them Middle part of the ship at 6 P.M. set sail with light Breezes & pleasant weather
