Remarks On Board The Ship Haugue from St. Augustin Bay
Thursday 21st Day of July 1836

This day the wind light from the land & strong from the sea the Starboard watch on liberty the watch employed in Sunday Gals got two boats from shore the ship Galeonville had one boat crew run away with a boat the Steward blacks with 4 others stole 98 Dollars & provisions enough to last them 10 or 12 days in 3 or 4 days they were off caught & brought to the ship Master asked the Steward was the last one that was caught & the Steward escaped death he crawled down over the mountains near to the water not far from the shiping & as fortune would have it the first officer of the ship parting sailing along the shore near where he leigh the Steward tried to hollow for assistance but was so far exhausted that he could not make him under stand but the officers heard a singular noise he looked & saw him move he approached the shore took him up & carried him on board the Captain had to pay me 1000 \$ & a considerable number to the natives for catching the men

Friday 22nd

On this day fine breezes from its usual quarters & good weather got at 8 o'clock of water in the morning & hoisted it in the Starboard watch went ashore on liberty the Starboard employed in hauling down water Chined Ship Bayard

Saturday 23rd

The first part of this Day the wind light middle & later part blowing strong from the land & some squally all hands employed in ships duty setting up rigging sent down fore & main 14 yards & masts & made other preparations for sea sailed South America

Sunday 24th

The first part of this Day fine breezes from the S.E. & good weather at 5 O'clock called all hands & raised our anchor with 3 topsails set now the fore & main the topsails full now quick as thought she gathers way in the water down fore & main tacks & set the fore & main the ship quick through the water at 7 we were clear the land the wind increasing Double reefed topsails at 10 took in fore & main sail to secure the anchors we took the sail on the chains & let them run below the ends this day including 12 hours sailed in company with Ship Emerald Capt. A. P. T. Ship South Carolina Terrey Ship Gave Smith Ship Galeonda Chase

Monday 25th Day of July

Sea Account all these 24 hours strong gails from the S.E. the first part passing clouds later part squally & some showers of rain under short sail standing to the S.W. the ship then sailed in company all in sight

Tuesday 26th Day

All these 24 hours strong gails winds from the S.E. & West & squally weather attended with light showers of rain at 1 O'clock the wind more to the Westward hooked ship & stood to the South So. Ends these 24 hours under Double reefed fore & main sail stood the Emerald & South Carolina in sight at vary bad head sea run Latitude by Observation 25-14 South

Wednesday 27th

All these 24 hours strong winds later part squally & showery at 3 P.M. after the ship arrived at St. Pauls Capt Barker 14 months out 700 blk of white sugar & 500 of spec oil bound in to St. Augustin Bay under short sail all these 24 hours standing to the South & W. in sight at 4 P.M. Latitude Obs 25-47 South Longitude at 2 P.M. by Chro

Thursday 28th

The first part of these 24 hours strong winds & squally weather attended with light rain middle & later part light breezes from the West & pleasant weather the watch employed in sundary Gals such as repairing the boat to work on rigging at 6 O'clock turned out all reefs & set M. & J. the S. Carolina of our sea the Latitude Obs 26-53 Longitude at 2 P.M. 42-13-00 E

Friday 29th

All these 24 hours light & hapling winds & Calms clear & pleasant weather the watch employed in sundary Gals painted two boats about the M. sail to give it some repair saw a finback the only whale that we have seen since we sailed these 24 hours Ends with Calms clear & warm weather Latitude Obs 27-15 Longitude at 2 P.M. 43-05-40
