

Remarks On Board The Ship Naugah

Tuesday 3rd Day of January
first & middle part of these 24 hours light breezes from the S.E. later part fresh breezes from the E. & S. E. squalls of rain Course W. by N. all sail set to the best advantage at 9 A.M. saw a ship ahead standing to the N. E. W. Latitude 27° 02'

Wednesday 4th
P.M. Commences with lively breezes from the E. & S. E. middle & later part strong breezes & some squally at 11 P.M. took in all studding sails at 5 A.M. set them again Course W. by N. to W. S. W. Latitude Obs 26° 07'

Thursday 5th
First & middle part of these 24 hours lively breezes from the S. E. & S. passing clouds at 10 P.M. took in all studding sails at 11 took in 2 sails at 4 A.M. blowing strong by squalls & rain thunder & lightning at 6 spoke the ship Bartholomew with 2000 lbs. powder & several men down with the survey there 24 hours ends with light breezes from the S. W. & good weather starboard tack aboard the ship Latitude 26° 10' Longitude at 4 P.M. 56° 52' Course W. S. W.

Friday 6th
first part light breezes from the West middle & later part small breezes from the S. E. & overcast under all sail steering W. by N. ends these 24 hours with 6 men in the boats list 5 of them with the survey Latitude Obs Longitude at 2 P.M. 57° 44' Longitude at 2 P.M. 57° 44' Longitude at 2 P.M. 57° 44'

Saturday 7th
P.M. Commences with light breezes from the East & pleasant weather later part fine leading breezes under all sail steering W. by N. the North America in sight Latitude Obs 25° 36'

Sunday 8th
all these 24 hours strong breezes from the East to N. E. all sail these 24 hours set to the best advantage at 6 A.M. raised 4 anchors ship of our sea, bay at 10 A.M. spoke her which proved to be the ship Lucas of New Bedford 7 months out 1300 lbs. of whale & 200 of sperm oil. bound of the South head of Madagascar No cruise in. Got some pots & some pickled onions may will be a great help to the crew at home got the survey

Monday 9th Day of January 1837
all these 24 hours strong breezes from the N. E. & pleasant weather at 6 P.M. in company with the ship Lucas laid a shoal of whale lowered for them with no success the Lucas shortened sail & left to the wind we kept our course & spread our lappet sails to the heavenly breeze & quick they sped her way towards the land of Liberty at 6 P.M. made the land the S. E. part of Madagascar bearing about N. W. by compass Course stood from W. to W. S. W. latitude 25° 53'

Tuesday 10th
all these 24 hours fresh breezes from N. E. to East & fine weather we have a strong current in our favor the first part by observations the current set us nearly 4 miles per hour Course from W. by S. to W. S. W. Latitude 26° 57' Long at 4 P.M. by Chron 47° 00'

Wednesday 11th
all these 24 hours lively breezes from East to S. E. & passing clouds all sail set to the best advantage steering West & N. E. S. Latitude

Thursday 12th
first & middle part of these 24 hours light breezes from S. E. to South & cloudy weather at 12 middle part took in all studding sails ends with strong breezes from the S. E. & passing clouds first part spoke the ship Triton of Portsmouth. Retch came 2000 lbs. bound home Course stood these 24 hours W. by S. Latitude 29° 00' S Longitude at noon 59° 00' 00' by lunar

Friday 13th
first & middle part strong breezes from South to S. E. & squally weather at 6 P.M. double reefed 3 sails at 3 P.M. raised 4 sail astern at 12 middle part the part us at 4 A.M. 3 sail in sight all steering the same way at 10 the wind halled in the beam set studding sails lively breeze & passing clouds to ends these 24 hours the watch employed in ship's duty repaired the spanker & bent it lat 30° 38' latitude

Saturday 14th
P.M. Commences with light breezes from the S. E. & fine weather middle & later part lively breezes & passing clouds first part 3 ships in sight 1 of the sea-bow 1 of the sea-burn & one of the sea-guards at later part 1 of the starboard beam Course stood W. by S. & S. latitude Long at 4 P.M. 58° 25' 15'
