

Thursday 3, Wind about the same blowing a gale the ship  
sailing the night 12 o'clock at night, at which  
time the gale abated and the ship increased  
sail — — — No observation

Friday 4, Wind to the westward the most of the day the sun  
shone. We had a gale again in the night, when  
the old ship had to lay to again. This is  
delightful sport knocking about here. —  
Lat 53.44 Long 76.48

Saturday 5, The wind went down early in the morning, and  
changed in to the S.W. but allowance of  
water was reduced to 2 gts. We saw a brig  
over the windward quarter about 4 o'clock bearing  
down on us. She put us in the evening by  
making the wind more free, the day was  
breezy and cold. —

— — — Lat 52.00 Long 76.57  
Sunday 6, Wind from the S.W. West, the day breezy  
and cold, with sail and sun in the  
evening was pleasant, the moon shining  
bright — — — Lat 52.00 Long 77.00

Monday 7, Wind at West in forenoon, the moon went  
back into the S.W. West, breezy and rainy,  
No observation

Tuesday 8, Wind at the Southward, the day pleasant  
the ship making good headway, the deck  
dry to dry, making it more comfortable —  
Lat 48.12 Long 76.52

Wednesday 9, Wind from the same quarter but light, the  
day pleasant — — — Lat 46.27 Long —

Thursday 10, Wind the same. The day pleasant and more  
moderate as we get to the Northward we  
discover — — — Lat 44.13 Long 76.50

Friday 11, Wind from the Northward, the day pleasant  
and it showed a gale of wind in the  
night. — — — Lat 42.53 Long 75.50

Saturday 12, The wind the same ahead with a heavy sea  
the water still and rainy —  
No observation

Sunday 13, The gale continued with rain in the middle  
of the afternoon. When it changed into the  
S.W. West 15 miles out —  
No observation

Monday 14, The wind to the Northward again. It seems if  
Fate was against us, having had horrible winds  
the day pleasant and moderate —  
Lat 41.03 Long 74.24

Tuesday 15, Wind the same, the day pleasant. We made  
land again about 10 o'clock in the forenoon  
between Labrador and the Island of Chikla  
on the Coast of China. We had a fine view  
of the Mountains of the Indies. At the Cape  
Interior of running in the Fuchuanwa which  
lays in Lat 36.41. Long 73.09. We saw and  
English Brig bound the same way and soon  
lost her — — — Lat 34.20

Wednesday 16, Wind at East, breezy and cold, the Brig  
in sight that we lost yesterday. The sun  
rose beautiful this morning right out of the  
Ocean. The Surgeon Longing to get  
into port. We were but a short time  
of it from the storm —  
Lat 38.52

Thursday 17, Wind S.W. West and light about a Calm  
the water more and pleasant again. The  
Brig and another vessel in sight —  
Lat 38.28

Friday 18, Wind S.W. West about a 4 mile Breeze  
the water good. The vessel in sight  
the sun set pleasant —  
Lat 37.41

Saturday 19, Wind light from the S.W. West the ship having  
for the Entrance to the Bay of Fuchuanwa  
we entered the mouth of the Bay about dark  
with the wind blowing out here in the Northward  
which made it necessary to wait. But on Monday
