Sunday May the 25th 1841
commenced with a light breeze
from S by E steering N by E 2 sail
in sight. Middle Part the same S by E
and with breeze from S by E 3 sail in
sight. Lat. 35.30 Long by Sun... 72-08

Monday May the 26th 1841
First Part a fine breeze from S by E at
the 25th at 11 AM saw 3 sail and a schooner line
at 952 - Latter Part a fresh breeze from
S by E steering N. the water green 2 sail
in sight. Lat. 37.43 - Long 72.13

Tuesday May the 27th 1841
commenced with a light breeze from
S by E at 11 AM the try cabin overboard
at 953 Middle Part heavy rain and a squall attended
with thunder and lightning at 9 PM passed a
brig steering to the eastward. Latter Part the wind
light from the south is rainy and foggy
weather at 8 AM soundings got bottom in 65 fathoms
at 10 AM do 40 No obs this day - saw a ship

Wednesday May the 28th 1841
commenced with light wind from the south
the 28th thick and rainy got the ship sail masted again
at 954 boom in and at 4 PM in sight at 7.30 at 10-27 spoke a
fisherman Middle Part foggy lay a back at 3 PM
steered to the eastward light air from the south
in 16 fth water spoke a schooner bound to the
Long Island shore in sight. " "

Thursday May the 29th 1841 - 955

First Part these 24 hours a light breeze from
S by E steering down the sound for the
passage to the sound at 6 PM Montock lights in
sight bearing a number of vessels in sight
of all riggs Middle Part a moderate breeze at midday
thick and foggy lay a back & then steam of again
E by S about 10 sail at 6 PM saw a pilot boat
bound here in for the sound many foggy several
vessels fishing their way in

Friday May the 30th 1841 - 956
commenced with a light breeze from
W by N steering down the sound foggy at
times at 5 PM came to anchor in Horns hole
soon after the science came to Middle Part
a fresh breeze from N by E breeze

Saturday May the 31st 1841 - Horns hole - 957
these 24 hours strong breeze from N by E to
East. The science lying here bound to the
Eastward a number of sail passed to the westward
and the wind ahead no prospect of it being
fair

Sunday June the 1st 1841 - 958
these 24 hours commenced with a cold easterly
wind still wind bound in the hole Middle
and Latter Part the same -

Monday June the 2nd 1841
commenced with a moderate breeze the weather
Latter Part a breeze from N by E at 4 PM left
Horns hole for the bar at 10 AM came to
anchor back the bar sent down the small
sloop took a lighter a long side
