

Remarks Tuesday, August 5th 1845

Begins with light airs from the Western board with fog spoke ship Phoenix of New London with 1950 bbls of oil middle and latter part thick fog and calm. So Ends 8 sail in sight.



Wednesday Aug 6th

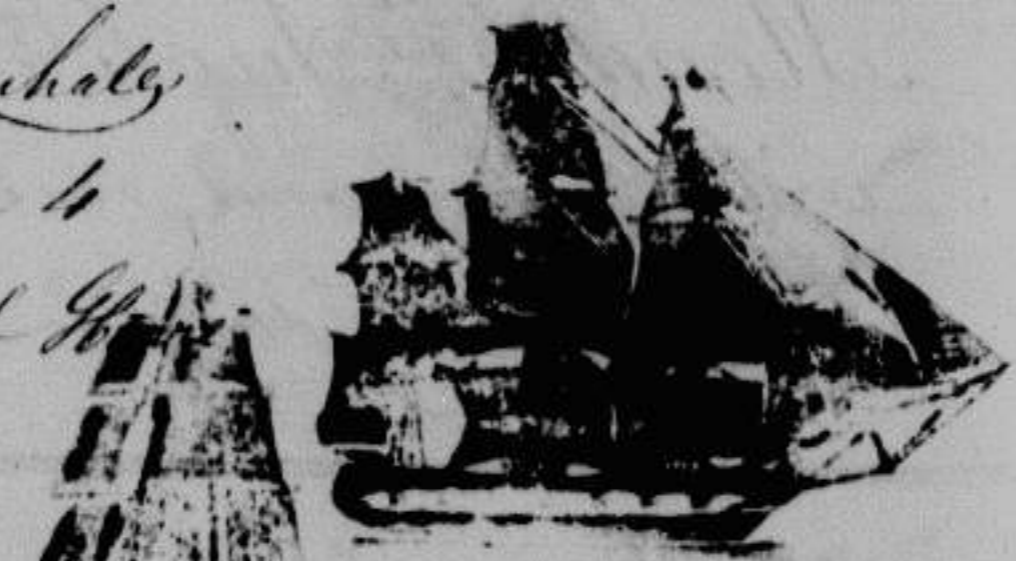
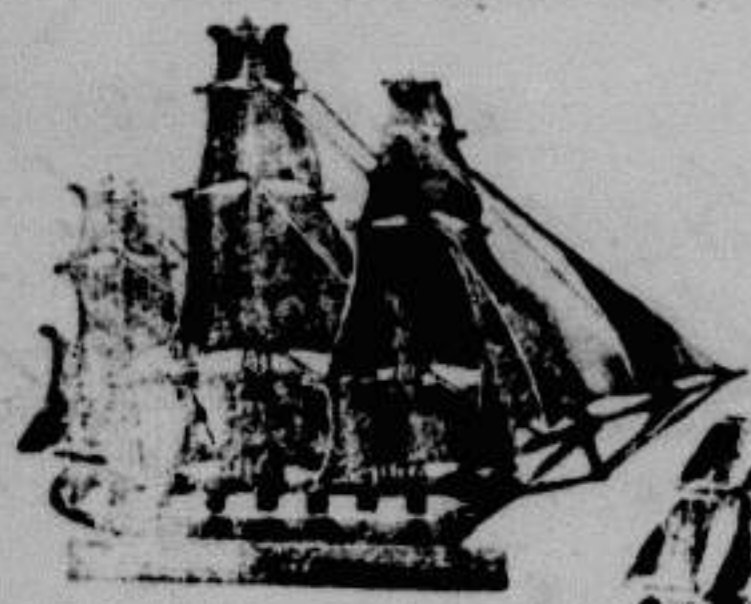
All these 24 hours light breezes and pleasant no whale in sight - 24 ships in sight and none bearing land in sight bearing West dist 50 miles. Lat 52° 58' North

Thursday Aug 7th Begins with calm 91 sail in sight middle part light airs from the East latter part hard gales with rain. So Ends. No Observation.

Friday Aug 8th Begins with strong gales from the East spoke ship

Graper. S.B. with 4 whales. Hannibal of S.L. 3100 bbls. George of Harre 2 whales

Saney of Harre 3 whales Catchlot of Harre 4 whales. Manche of Harre with 3 whales



Remarks Saturday, August 9th 1845

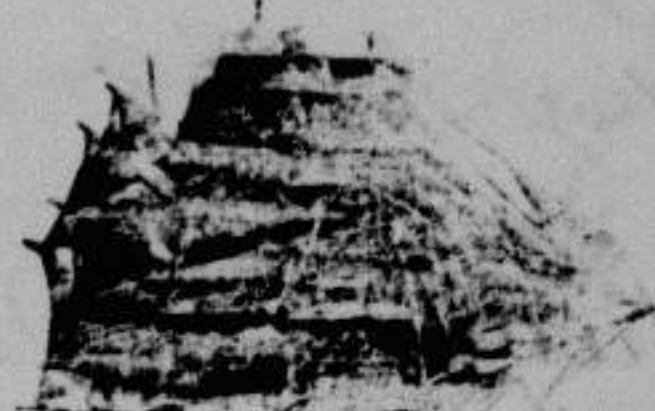
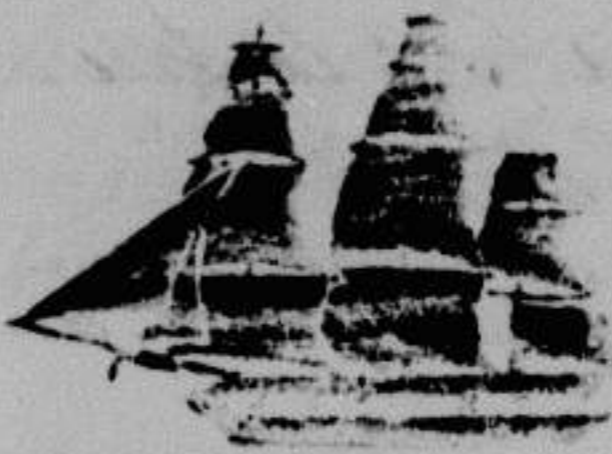
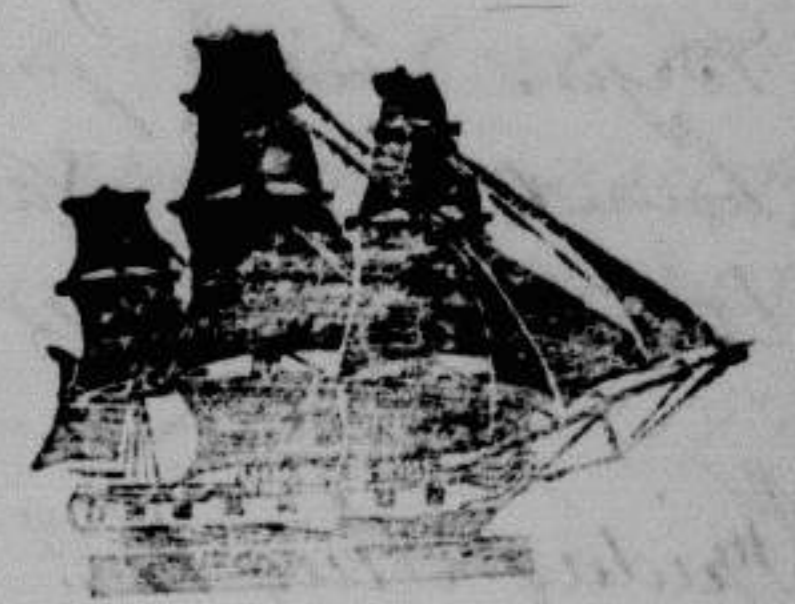
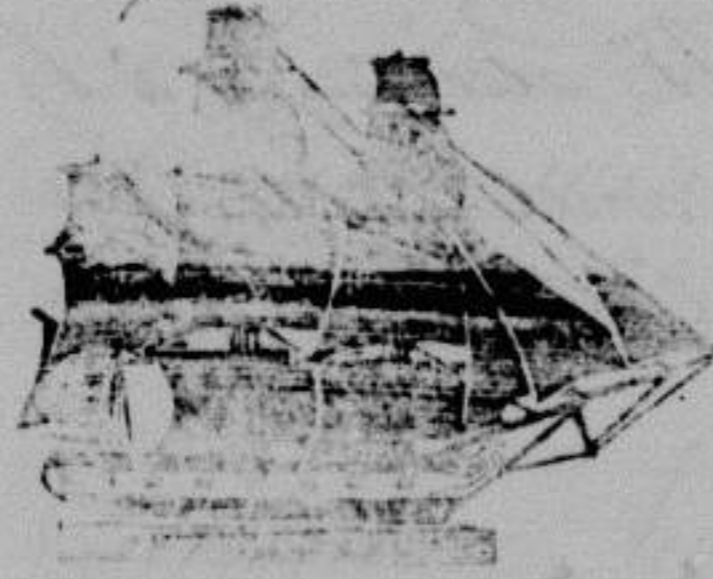
Begins with strong gales from the Southern board, middle part hard gales. latter part the same with fog and rain. So Ends. So Ob.

Sunday Aug 10th

Begins with thick fog at 3 PM fog cleared up spoke

ship Splendid of Cold Spring with 1000 bbls. and ship Isaac Hicks of New London with 1400 middle and latter

part pleasant spoke ship Helen of S.B. 4 whales. barque Hornman of Albury. So Ends. Lat by obs. 52° 58' North



Monday Aug 11th

Begins with strong breezes from the Southern board middle part the same latter part strong gales from S.W. steering S.E. So Ends. Lat by obs. 52° 40' N Long 163° 00' E

Tuesday Aug 12th

All these 24 hours fresh breezes from the S.W. steering S.E. several sail in sight and no whale. So Ends. Lat 51° 57' North Long 163° 15' East
