

Remarks Sunday March 8th 1846

All these 24 hours pleasant weather - one watch ashore on liberty. 6 ships came in to the harbour

Monday March 9th All these 24 hours pleasant employed calking the ship one watch on liberty

Tuesday March 10th All this day pleasant watch on liberty. employed getting off water -

Wednesday March 11th All these 24 hours fresh breezes watch on liberty. So Ends -

Thursday March 12th -
calm weather watch on liberty. So Ends

Friday March 13th Pleasant weather one watch on liberty shipped Chas. P. Scudder cooper and Thos. Durham seaman. So Ends

Saturday March 14th Fresh breezes employed clearing up decks and getting ready for sea. So Ends

Sunday March 15th

The first of these 24 hours light - windy latter part strong breezes got underway and went to sea

Remarks Monday March 16th 1846

All of these 24 hours light breezes Weather in sight - bearing S. S. W. dist - 20 miles. Lat - 21° 13' N Long 157° 11' W

Tuesday March 17th

All these 24 hours calm pleasant weather saw 2 humpbacks toward boat but could not get fast. Lat - 21° 52' S Long -

Wednesday March 18th

Commences with light breezes and pleasant middle and latter part strong breezes the island of Atou in sight - bearing S. W. dist - 40 miles 3 sail in sight. So Ends. Lat 21° 50' Long 157° 16' W

Thursday March 19th

Begins with light bafflin wind laying off and on at Myraa bay two boats on shore trading for hogs at sundown came on board and kept off steering N by S. Montezuma of New London in sight and part bafflin. latter part fresh breezes 2 sail in sight. So Ends. Lat 22° 12' Long 158° 42' W

Friday March 20th

Begins with fresh breezes from the S & steering West spoke ship Montezuma of New London 22 mms out - 2000 lbs middle and latter part strong breezes. hands employed in ship's duty. So Ends - Lat by obs - 22° 58' North Long by Chron - 16
