

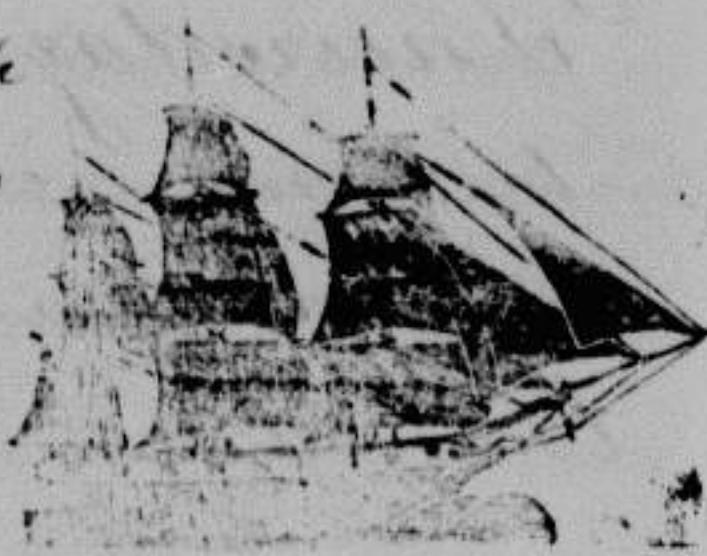
Remarks on Board Monday June 15th
 Begins with a calm and thick fog middle and
 latter parts clear with nothing in sight. So Ends
 Lat 47° 10' N. Long 158° 10' East =

Tuesday June 16th

All these 24 hours calm with nothing in sight
 hands employed in ship's duty. So Ends 300 lbs

Wednesday June 17th

Begins with calm weather and
 thick fog at 11 A.M. spoke ship
 Saratoga of New Bedford 10 whales
 this season. So Ends this day.



Thursday June 18th

The first and middle parts of these 24 hours
 dead calm and thick fog. latter part clear
 plenty of finbacks in sight but no right whales
 Lat 47° 33' N. Long 157° 44' E

Friday June 19th

All these 24 hours light breezes from the West
 on Board steering S.E. with nothing in sight
 Lat 48° 07' N. Long 159° 12' E

Saturday June 20th

All these 24 hours light airs and bafflin with
 nothing in sight but water and sky. So Ends
 Latitude 46° 16' North
 Longitude 159° 11' East

Remarks on Board Sunday June 21st
 Begins with light winds from the Southern Board
 steering E by S saw several finbacks and
 humpbacks at 6 P.M. saw one right whale
 lowered boats struck him and killed him
 and he sunk of course middle and
 latter parts thick fog. Lat 46° 30' N.
 Long 159° 47' E

Monday June 22nd

Begins with light breezes from the South with
 fog equally at 1 P.M. saw whales lowered boats
 could not get fast. at 6 P.M. lowered again but with
 no better success middle part foggy latter part
 rainy. So Ends No Observation.

Tuesday June 23rd

Begins with strong winds from the Eastern Board
 heading South with thick rainy weather saw a
 ship sailing middle and latter parts fresh gales
 with fog and rain. So Ends. No Observation

Wednesday June 24th

Begins with strong breezes from the North with
 fog and rain at 4 P.M. saw whales lowered boats
 and chased two sail in sight middle part
 the same latter part saw one Barrow at 10
 P.M. saw one whale chased him off. So Ends
 Lat 48° 23' N. Long 161° 20' E
