These 24 hours begin with calm and raining  
weather at 1 P.M. down boats for black fish  
without success the old man is for  
newton and touch the leader in a boat  
middle part light baffling winds and  
raining. Latter part fresh breezes from  
the S.W. and torrents of rain steering  
SSE with topmast and lower standing  
sails out. All watch employed in  
washing clothing & so ends these 24 hours  
No Obs this day

Monday  
August  
13<sup>th</sup> 1835

Moves towards Cape Horn  
These 24 hours begin with strong breezes from  
the SSW and pleasant at 7 P.M. raining  
at heavy squall or gust of wind struck  
the ship and laid her on her beam ends  
let go the topsail hatches and she  
righted full 2 reefs in the topsail  
Latter part stem made sail as requisite  
All watch employed in sheathing decks  
or so ends this day. Lat by Obs 8° 34' N  
Long by Watch 19° 52' W

Tuesday  
August 4<sup>th</sup>  
1835

These 24 hours light baffling winds  
throughout and pleasant - heading to  
the SSE and SE Winds from SSW to S  
by the S employed sheathing decks & so ends  
Lat by Obs 8° 16' N  
Long by Watch 18° 55' W

Wednesday  
August 5<sup>th</sup>  
1835

These 24 hours light air from all quarters  
and pleasant weather heading from W to  
East by the S. All went to the Wagon top sail  
and took a fair off from the foot it  
being too deep to set well said grassy  
and Porpoise. All broke out the tent and  
carpent it, and so forth so ends this day  
Lat by Obs 8° 00' N  
Long 19° 51' West

Thursday  
August  
6<sup>th</sup> 1835

These 24 hours begin with calm and clear weather  
at 7 P.M. moderate gales from the S.W. to  
S. All strong breezes took in the topsail  
at 8 single reef the topsails were employed  
making Gaskets for topsail & G. yards  
latter part fresh gales from the SSW heading  
SE so ends this day. I Boat (Lion) for  
blackfish without success. Lat 6° 58' N  
Long 18° 15' West

Friday  
July 31<sup>st</sup>  
1835

These 24 begin with light baffling winds  
and raining. All watch employed in  
scrubbing the decks middle & Latter part  
moderate gales from WSW to SW  
and pleasant weather all sail set  
to advantage steering S by W at heavy  
swell from the SE. All watch employed  
in ships duty so ends this 24 hours  
Lat by Obs 10° 47' N  
Long by Watch 22° 30' West

Saturday  
August 1<sup>st</sup>  
1835

These 24 hours moderate gales from W to  
S.W. and pleasant weather at 7 P.M.  
set the standing sails at 8 A.M. took in  
the standing sails and braced up shroups  
A.M. watch employed in sheathing the  
deck & so ends this 24 hours. Lat by Obs 10° 16' N  
Long by DR 22° 00'

Sunday  
August  
2<sup>nd</sup> 1835

These 24 hours begin with fine gales at  
7 P.M. took in the S.F. sails and double  
reefed the topsails at 8 wore ship to the  
SW Winds SSE at 2 till wore ship  
and headed S by E winds SW by W and made  
sail middle part raining. Latter part  
calm. All watch employed sheathing the  
decks so ends this day. Lat by DR 8° 45' N
