

Ship Isaac Howland from the
 Sunday
 23d 1835
 August
 Begins with light winds from the SE
 and good weather. Come S.W. by S
 Middle part squally took in the S. E. sails
 and jibing jib at 12 P.M. wind shifted
 to the E. S. E. Latter part strong breezes
 set main S. E. sail so ends Sunday
 Lat by Obs 19° 00' S
 Long by Obs 32° 11' 34" W

Monday
 August
 24th
 1835
 Sailed
 Ship
 Begins with strong E. S. E. winds and
 flying clouds Come S.W. by S. Main S. E. S.
 but saw a ship off our bow. Middle part very
 squally single reefed the topsails
 Latter part pleasant set S. E. sails. In
 S. E. most studding sail wind heaving
 gradually to the N. E. saw 3 macks so
 ends another day Lat by Obs 21° 41' S
 Long by Chron 34° 12' W

Tuesday
 August
 25th
 1835
 Begins with the wind Easterly hauling
 gradually to the North weather fine
 heavy swell from the N. E. saw a ship
 steering to the North close heaved pile
 bent New Mizzen topsail jib & fore sail
 broke out the fore hole for weather at
 9 P.M. wind shifted to the N. E. Latter
 part fine gales and clear studding sails
 out below a cleft All bent the staysails
 so ends Course S.W. by S Lat 24° 13' S
 Long 36° 03' West

Wednesday
 August
 26th
 1835
 Begins with the wind from the N. E. and
 clear all hands employed on the rigging struck
 the royal yards and rigged in the S. E. jib
 Boom Middle & Latter part strong gales
 and clear weather so ends this day
 Course S.W. Lat by Obs 26° 50' S
 Long by D.R. 38° 56' West

Azores towards Cape Horn
 Thursday
 August
 27th
 1835
 Begins with strong N. E. winds and clear
 weather on S. W. by S course at 4 A.M.
 took in the studding sails M. S. G. sail & double
 reefed the topsails sharp lightning in the
 West at 5 wind shifted in a tremendous
 squall to the N. W. heavy shower of rain
 Latter part more moderate made sail
 to advantage so ends this day No Obs
 Lat by D.R. 28° 37'
 Long by Obs 40° 20' W

Friday
 August
 28th 1835
 Begins with moderate gales from the North
 and clear at 4 P.M. wind heaved to the
 W. S. W. at 7 took in the bow boat & heavy
 swell from the North & East at 10 P.M.
 The weather tacked to the N. E. Middle & Latter
 part moderate gales and clear winds
 all around the Compass All broke out
 4 casks of new bread from between decks
 to the South and coopered it so ends this day
 Lat by Obs 29° 30' S
 Long by Lunar Obs 40° 38' Long by Chron 40° 54' W

Saturday
 August
 29th
 1835
 Begins with fresh W. S. W. winds heading up
 South at 6 P.M. double reefed the topsails
 heaved jib & mainsail rained and fresh
 gales at 9 furled the S. P. Mizzen topsail
 Middle part heavy thunder squalls
 at 7 P.M. close reefed the S. P. Mizzen topsail
 and set them heading up S. S. E. a heavy
 swell from the S. W. so ends this day
 Long by Chron 40° 19' by Lunar 41° Lat by Obs 30° 32' S

I am quite started when the wind is free
 But thus contrary it destroys all my glee
 oil 60 days from N. Bedford and no
