Saturday
May 29th
1836
These 24 hours strong S.W. winds and
cloudy heading up from E to S.E.
saw porpoises and crofish. All employed
steaming ship 30 miles this day.
Set by A.C. 0.50 North
Long by Chronometer 83° 59' West

Sunday
May 30th
1836
These 24 hours fresh S.W. winds heading
up S.E. carrying all S.E. sails
with employed pleating & setting
30 miles this day. Set by A.C. 0.07 S
Long by Chronometer 82° 44'

Monday
May 31st
1836
These 24 hours fresh winds from S to S.W.
heading up from S.E. to S.S.E. All employed
scrapping stanchions & 30 miles this day.
Set by A.C. 47 miles South
Long Chronometer 81° 31' West

Tuesday
June 1st
1836
First part of these 24 hours light winds
and pleasant weather heading up
S.E. by 6 at 6 P.M. spoke ship Loggan of
A. Delford 28 months out 400 lbs at
6 A.M. made the Island of Pile bearing
East dist 20 miles at 6 P.M. tacked to
the westward at meridian tacked to
the S.E. 30 miles this day. Set by A.C.
(Island of Pile bearing) 1° 25' South
Dist by Est 40 miles

Wednesday
June 2nd
1836
Begins with pleasant & yates and
fine weather heading up S.E.
at 8 P.M. tacked ship to the Westward
at 12 P.M. tacked heading up from
S.E. to S.S.E. All point St. Helena in
sight at meridian it bore by compass East
Dist by Est 15 miles 30 miles this day
Set by A.C. 2° 10' South

Bored in for Puyter
Thursday
June 3rd
1836
First part of these 24 hours light winds
and pleasant weather heading up from S.E.
to S.S.E. with all drawing sail set.
current setting strong to the northward
latter part calm and light steaming a ship
out side 30 ends these 24 hours
Land in sight at 10 by A.C. 2° 19' South

Friday
June 4th
1836
First part light winds heading to
the westward at 9 P.M. tacked to the S.E.
Middle and latter part strong S.W. winds
headed S.W. Mizen S.E. Sails & flying jib
set. A brig in sight on our weather
quarter standing to the S.E. 30 miles this day
humpbacks in sight. Set by A.C. 3° 06' South

Saturday
June 5th
1836
First part of these 24 hours fresh winds at
3 P.M. heading up S.S.E. set S.W. Mizen S.E. Sails
and flying jib at 4 P.M. made the land
at 7 P.M. tacked to the westward at 11 P.M.
at 11 P.M. tacked to the S.S.E. at 6 A.M.
tacked of shore. All light winds headed
the schooner Amencle of Baltimore
and brought 400 oranges. A great number
of humpbacks in sight 30 miles this day
the main land in sight. Set by A.C. 3° 27' South

Monday
June 6th
1836
First part of these 24 hours moderate
S.W. winds and pleasant weather heading
up S.S.E. a number of small craft in sight
at 7 P.M. tacked to the westward at
7 A.M. tacked in shore and with strong
S.W. winds. Set by A.C. 3° 53' South

Tuesday
June 7th
1836
First part of these 24 hours strong S.W. winds
single reefed the topsails tacking ship as requisite
at 7 P.M. Cape Blanco bore S.W. dist by Est 10 miles
latter part strong breezes heading in shore
at meridian Cape Blanco bore East dist 25 miles. Set 4° 12' South
