Tuesday
July 26
1836

These 24 hours strong ESE winds and clouds heading up South at 7 P.M. took her to the NE. Lat. 10.20 N. took her to the southward under double reef topsails, jib & main sail furled employed repairing deck and fore topsail. Saw pinbecks 30 miles this day.

Long 102° 30' West

Wednesday
July 27
1836

First part of these 24 hours fresh winds and clouds at 1 P.M. raised a sail off the lee beam bore up and ran for her at 3 spoke the ship Lima of San-
tucket Capt. Payer 27 months out 6000 lbs at 6 A.M. took her to the NE. Lat. 10.20 N. part fresh gales double reef jib & main sail furled. No obs.



Thursday
July 28
1836

First part of these 24 hours strong gales heading up W by E ship Lima in sight 6 miles to the leeward taking ship as requisite. Latter part latter part strong gales with heavy squalls of wind and rain everything in sight. No obs.

Friday
July 29
1836

First part of these 24 hours strong ESE gales double reefs in and jib & main sail furled on the southern tack at 6 P.M. came ship to the NE. Only with fresh gales. Lat by Obs 4° 31' South

Cruising in the South Pacific in 1836

Saturday
July 30
1836

First part of these 24 hours strong ESE gales running with the wind 2 points free on each tack at midday steering N by E under double reef topsails saw pinbecks watches employed coopersmith, mending sails, turning belaying pins, making buckets, forging hooks & thumbles, stopping blocks, grinding & setting up craft, &c. Latter part more moderate winds this day.

Long by Acc 105° 00' West

Sunday
July 31
1836

Fresh winds throughout standing to the N at 7 A.M. were ship to the southward. Nothing in sight. Lat by Obs 4° 42' S

Monday
August 1
1836

First part of these 24 hours fresh ESE winds heading up W by E at 2 P.M. spoke ship of Edgar 32 months out 6000 lbs. Latter part more moderate winds. This day Lat 6° 00' S
