Thursday
Sept 29th

Strong trades and squally standing South at 6 AM raised A school of whales covered 4 boats fastened to 2 of them killed 1 lost the other. by the lines parting at 10 AM took down whale along side and began L. B. 45 to cut 30 ends Lat 5° 26' South Long 106° 16' West

Friday
Sept 30th

At 3 PM finished cutting and stowed to the South at 11 took up strong gales and reggled so ends Lat by obs 5° 10' South

Saturday
Oct 1st

Still more moderate employed boiling at 9 PM finished All strong gales respect the topsails so ends

Sunday
Oct 2nd 1836

More moderate much sail beating to the windward nothing in sight Lat by obs 5° 40' S

Monday
Oct 3rd

Light winds and pleasant weather flying to the windward under all drawing sail employed variously Lat by obs 5° 10' South Long by Pinner Ditt 105° 16' West Lat by obs 105° 40' S

Tuesday
Oct 4th

These 24 hours pleasant trades and clear weather (that is on account of its been being my birth day) working to the Providence no whales mending sails Lat 5° 23' South

Wednesday
Oct 5th

These 24 hours pleasant winds and weather standing South at 6 PM took up NE All stowed down 42 bls of oil in the Fore hold saw squid Lat by D.R. 4° 50' South

Thursday
Oct 6th

Begins with fresh trades and lovely weather standing on the Southern tack at 6 PM saw a ship off the Lee bearing standing on the Southern tack at 2 AM hauled ship at 10 AM spoke ship Martha Capt Riddle 37 months west 1400. Patter part light winds and clear Lat by obs 4° 31' S

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
