and took in M.T. & C. V. at 7 P.M.
turned S. & saw 11 fin back
Sat 4.44 S
Long 106.10 West

Monday Sept 18th 1837
Moderate trades and
clear weather heading South nothing in
sight
Sat by Cas 3.47 S
Long by Chron 105.45 W

Tuesday Sept 19th 1837
First part light winds
middle & latter part squally
with rain. Remained the 11th
T. G. Christ V. J. G.
Wm. L. N. M.
Sat by Cas 4.08
Long by Chron 105.45 W

Wednesday Sept 20th 1837
Squally throughout this day
heading up from South to P. & E.
under the whole topsails and watches
mending the main topsail brace & the
sails are getting rather weak. The
Porter will depend on what
again it would certainly strengthen them
& this is a very time with us. But I

Sat by a rough calculation
6.10 South

Thursday Sept 21st 1837
Fresh trades and passing clouds
heading up from South to P. & E. Men
mending old sails & saw 11 fin back
Sat by Cas 4.08
Long by Sun 106.20 West

Friday Sept 22nd 1837
These 24 hours squally weather with
frequent showers of rain nothing in sight
heading up P. by E. Sat by D. R. 9.10 S
under single reefed Top sails, Gertrude?
