Courses from N to N by N wind moderate weather saw a topsail schooner standing in shore Cooper & his mate employed setting up pike shoots sailors variously employed Lat by obs 11° 00' N
Long by C 81° 03' West

Friday
November
10th

Moderate trades and pleasant Course N to N by N Cooper setting up pike shoots Boatsteersmen filling their boats Sailors variously employed saw a sea turtle hauled for him without success saw blackfish Lat by obs 10° 10' N
Long by C 81° 37' West

Saturday
November
11th 1837

These 24 hours wind and weather much the same as yesterday employed variously Lat by obs 9° 13' N

Sunday
November
12th

It is dry times that is all I can say about it I am most dead lost my appetite and gained 4 horses Lat by obs 9° 11' North

From Callao towards Imlig

Monday These 24 hours strong trades and clear saw a ship in these of
November 13th whales at 3 P.M. raised a galleon whale lowered our boats and sheet till sun set and then gave him up
Courses from N by N to North Lat by obs 5° 40' N
Long by C 81° 03' West

Tuesday Strong trades and clear Course N to N
November at 7 P.M. hauled up N by C
14th latter part light winds and 1837 thick foggy weather saw finbacks Lat by obs 4° 26' North
Long by Chron 82° 50' W

Wednesday Begins with light E & trades and November 15th hazy weather steering E & by compass and N by North at 9 A.M. made cape Blanco bearing E by N latter part strong breezes and clear saw a ship heading up the coast Lat by obs 4° 16' North

Thursday Strong trades running down the coast with all clothing set at
November at 7 P.M. came to the wind 16th with the main topsail to the mast heading off shore latter part calm Lat by obs 3° 45' N
At Morillon the land Dist 10 miles
