

Remarks While Cruising In The

Monday May 29th Day

First part strong breezes from the westward. Ship under double reefed top sails heading to the southward. At 3 P.M. wore ship to the northward. At 4 P.M. saw Cape Olvin bearing, or distant 15 miles. Middle part calm and breeze up again from N.E. and hauled gradually to the S.E. Latter part the land about Finnish bay in sight. Stead in towards it. Saw a number of ships all standing off shore. Wore ship and stood off, blowing heavy from S.E.

Tuesday May 30th

First part strong gales from S.E. Ship under close reefed top sails heading S.E.W. Cape Olvin in sight to the northward. Middle part the gale moderates some. Ship heading to the southward under short sail. Latter part the wind changed to the eastward with a thick snow storm. Ends clear with light breezes. Ship under all sail heading to eastward. Wind N.W.E. the land about Finnish bay in sight

Wednesday May 31st

First part light breezes from N.W.E. and fine weather. Ship heading to the eastward in for the bay. At 6 P.M. bore head of land N.E. 8 miles distant. Middle and last part light breezes from the westward and fine weather. Stead in to the bay. Saw several ships but no whales. Spoke the Milo 2 whales this season

Thursday June 1st Day

First part light baffling winds and fine weather. Saw no whales. Spoke ship Florida nothing this season. At 8 P.M. anchored in 23 fathoms of water. Middle and last part equally weather. At 3 P.M. sent three boats in there after wood. Ends with fine weather. All hands employed getting off and stowing away wood.

Friday June 2nd

First part calm and rainy all hands employed getting off wood and stowing it away. got off about land. Middle part came on to blow heavy from S.E. with rough sea. At 9 P.M. got underway and stood out of the bay under short sail. At 7 A.M. latter part more moderate. Made all sail to the westward

Saturday June 3rd

First part light breezes from the eastward and fine weather. Ship under all sail steering W by S. Stowed the anchors and chains. Middle part fresh breezes with rain and snow. Course W.S.W. Latter part strong gales from S.E. with rain. Double reefed the top sails. At 11 A.M. took in the fore sail and fore top sail and bore to head westward

W.B. Cts.

Sunday June 4th

First part strong gales from S.E. rainy, snowy weather Ship under ~~all~~ ^{short} sail heading to the northward. Middle part more moderate made sail and kept off W.S.W. Latter part light airs from the westward and fine weather. Ship heading southward under all sail. One ship in sight

Lat 57.23. Long 144.38

Monday June 5th

First part light airs from the southward and calm. Ship heading to the westward. A ship in sight steering to westward. Middle and last part fresh breezes from the eastward and foggy. Ship under easy sail steering W.S.W.

Lat 56.52. Long 142.56

Tuesday June 6th

First part fresh breezes from east with fog. Course W.S.W. under all sail. Spoke the Phoenix of Nantucket one whale. Middle part lying aback. Thick fog. Latter part foggy and clear by spells. Ship under short sail heading to S.W. Wind S.E.

Lat 56.18. Long 141.37

Wednesday June 7th

First part light breezes from the eastward with fog. Ship under all sail heading to the southward. At 6 P.M. the lighted up some. Saw a whale. lowered all of the boats. Saw nothing more of the whale. Middle and last part calm and thick fog

Thursday June 8th

First part thick fog and calm. At 5 P.M. took a light breeze from S.W. Middle and last part light breezes from S.W. and fine weather. Saw one whale going quick did not lower. Saw several ships also Jonas Island to the N.E.
