

Ship James Allen outward bound
Sunday Nov 3rd 1844

Still moderately middle and latter part
bark winds from West steering NE by North
all drawing sails sound again. Lat 33 Long 34 43

Monday 4th

Fresh winds from West and four masts
one sail in sight steering NE at 1 P.M. steered
SE middle part squally latter part four
masts, 7 sails in sight steering NE one to the South

Tuesday 5th saw us Lat 31 31 Long 31 55

Still fine with fresh winds from NE at sunset
hauled up SE by Compass vary about 46° 31' W
middle and latter part light airs from W

2 sail in sight steering SE W sounds

Wednesday 6th Lat 29 53 Long 30 54

Full light airs at 5 P.M. sails to the N
middle and latter part four 2 Ships in
sight steering to the South I Allen running South

Thursday 7th Lat 28 44 Long 29 16

Light breezes from the North middle and
latter part light airs and squally 2 Ships in sight
steering to the South sounds running to the South

Lat 26 31 Long 28 05

Friday 8th

Still squally at 8 P.M. winds hauls to the NE
middle and latter part calm two Ships in
sight depends calm Lat 25 11 Long 27 58

Saturday 9th All these 24 hours calm employed in
ships duty sounds Lat 24 44 Long 27 01

Sunday 10th These 24 hours with light breeze
from SE Ships heading W M middle and
latter part squally wind SE by E saw 3 Ships
steering to the West Lat 22 44 Long 27 36

Monday 11th Still squally and winds from SE
middle and latter part the same I Allen
heading South and by E saw a Bark Ship
steering West sounds Lat 20 45 Long 27 11

James Allen for Cape Horn
Tuesday Nov 12th 1844

Still squally middle and latter part more
moderate winds sails to the NE steering SE
with all sails sound Lat 18 30 N Long 26 36.

Wednesday 13th

Four trades at sun down shortened sail for
the East and of St. Antonio at 11 P.M. saw the Island
ahead bearing South dist 10 miles at daylight
steered off and running down the N side
there becalmed the remainder of these 24 hours
sounded off the West side the Island.

Thursday 14th

Still calm spoke the Henry Astor, Coffin 28 days
from Nantucket all well, no sick at took a light
breeze from NE and steered SE by E middle and
latter part calm 3 Ships in sight sounds

Friday 15th

Lat 15 54 Long 25 01
This day light airs and calms middle part
middle part light airs latter part calm at
daylight - Breeze bore NE dist 15 miles sounds

Saturday 16th

Lat 14 54
Light airs and calm spoke Brig. Gen. Brown
56 days from Marsala in a state of mutiny
took the I Allen to be a Man of War and made
signals for assistance went on board at
daylight Breeze bore NE dist 50 miles sounds
two sail in sight Lat 13 37 No Altitudes

Sunday 17th

moderate winds from N NE middle
part fresh winds from East Ships running
by E latter part wind East part small
Ships steering to the N Henry Astor in sight
off our lee steering to the South sounds fresh

Monday 18th trades

Lat 11 00 Long 23 58
Still fresh winds steering South middle
and latter part squally winds from South to East
part a number of Ships the Henry Astor still in
sight sounds Lat 7 32 Long 23 00
