

James Allen for Cape Horn
Tuesday Nov 19th 1844

Still squally winds a head middle part squally
latter part fair weather 3 Ships sounds

Wednesday 20th Lat 7.09 Long 23 55

This day begins calm at 3 P.M. took a light
breeze from East stern by E middle latter

part squally with heavy showers of rain sounds
Thursday 21st Lat 6.10 Long 23 40

Still squally and rainy wind moderate muddly
and latter part winds from S.W. ship heading
up S.W. sounds one ship in sight

Friday 22nd Lat 4.56 Long 23 46

Commenced with fresh winds from S.W.
middle and latter part the same heading
up by the middle S.W. by S sounds

Saturday 23rd Lat 3.02 Long 24 33

Fresh winds from S.W. middle and
latter part moderate 4 ships in sight all
standing to the S.W. at 8 A.M. saw a school
of sperm whales young moderate to the N.W.
lower the boats struck one

Sunday 24th Lat 1.55 N Long 25 14

Fair weather at 5 P.M. took 5 wh. ahd along
side took in all sails except a close reefed
m. To speak by heading to the East. Prep. runing
to cut at daylight hooked on a number of
sail in sight so much cutting Lat 2.15 N Long 25 53

Monday 25th Still fair weather at 2 P.M. finished
cutting and made sail to the E.N.E. at 10
P.M. a total Eclipse of the Moon at daylight
began to look sounds (Wind S.W.)

Tuesday 26th Lat 3.04 N Long 24 53

Weather still fair middle and latter
part squally and rainy wind a head
one ship in sight sounds

Lat 3.40 N Long 24 27

James Allen outward bound
Wednesday Nov 27th 1844

Still squally and rainy wind a head
hard blowing at 11 P.M. took a heavy squall
from East took in all sails except double
reef'd topsails the day ends moderate
and fair at 11 A.M. finished looking sounds

Thursday 28th Lat 3.35 Long 24 35

Fine weather, wind a head making little
headway middle and latter part the same
winds head everint to the a head sounds

Friday 29th Lat 3.32 Long 26 48

Winds still a head, no chance to get along
middle and latter part the same sounds

Saturday 30th Lat 1.18 N Long 26 40

No wind and fair weather middle
and latter the same strong current setting
to the west so in as Lat 1.60 N Long 27 00

Sunday Dec 1st 1844

Fresh trades and fair weather, heading
up S.W. by S middle and latter part the
same sounds Lat 2.39 N Long 25 26

Monday 2nd Fresh trades and squally heading S.W.
middle and latter part fresh trades and
fair weather heading up S.W. so good

Tuesday 3rd Lat 4.53 N Long 27 07

Still fresh trades and fair weather, ship
on the wind to the S.W. middle and
latter part the same saw a sail standing to

Wednesday 4th Lat 7.22 Long 29 27

First part light trades and fair weather,
heading S.W. the remainder part fair
weather steering by N. 4 S.W. with the gale

Thursday 5th Lat 9.44 N Long 30 02

Light trades, weather fine middle and
latter part the same saw one ship standing
to the South Lat 12 32 Long 31 08
