Sunday 2nd Fresh winds from S.W. weather clear, a heavy
swell from N.W. at 4 P.M. past a Brig steering
S.W. middle light winds from North and N.W.
latter part fresh Gales from N. and rainy on
ship in sight sound winds and Lat 55 01 Long 84 21

Monday 3rd Still head winds middle part the same
at 8 A.M. took a fresh wind from S.W. steered
N.W. sound Lat 53 48 Long 84 34

Tuesday 4th Fresh winds from S.W. at 8 P.M. hails to the
west double reefed the Topsails and took in
the fore wind from N. and weather thick
heading N.W. sound Lat by Chron 51 14 Long 83 58

Wednesday 5th Fresh winds from N. course N. by N. W.
carrying double reefed Topsails middle
and latter part more moderate ship under
sail heading to the N. Lat 48 08 Long 82 34

Thursday 6th Still fresh winds from N. and fair weather
got out the Mast and Bow Boat saw a
Bark standing to the N. middle and latter
part the same sound Lat 45 44 Long 80 46

Friday 7th Francis S. Frank
Moderate winds from N.W. at 1 P.M. saw
Sperm Whale lower deck struck got the Boat
capsized lost our man belonging in Warren
R.I. at 5 P.M. took the whale to the ship took
in all sail except a close reefed main Topsail by
heading to the S.W. middle and latter part rainy
at daylight began to cut at noon finished and
made sail to the N.W. by N. Lat 46 Long 79 30
