James Allen off Shore
Thursday July 10th 1845

1 Breeze winds and fair weather, steering
the middle part bying aback some squally
at daylight steered N.W. at 11 A.M. saw
whales low down and struck sounds

Friday 11th Lat 52° Long 109° 30'

Strong winds to at 4 P.M. took the whale to
the ship by heading to the N.E. at daylight
were ship and broke up at 10 A.M. finished
and made fair to the N.E. Lat 40° Long 116° 32'

Saturday 12th

Still fresh winds at daylight began to boil
sounds strong winds and squally

Sunday 13th Lat 45° Long 110° 40'

Fresh winds and squally took in the fore
at midnight finished boiling to squally

Monday 14th Lat 51° Long 111° 45'

Squally and fresh winds ship under
close reefed topsails middle and latter
part more moderate Lat 57° Long 111° 31'

Tuesday 15th

Begins moderate and clear middle part
the same latter part fresh winds at 11 A.M.
saw whales struck one at midnight took to
the ship sounds boat in chase

Wednesday 16th Lat 50° Long 111° 25'

Good weather, at 4 P.M. finished cutting
and stood to the N.E. middle and latter
part fine weather, at daylight began
to boil sounds Lat 52° Long 111° 59'

Thursday 17th

Good weather, at sundown boat ship to
the N.E. middle and latter the same

Friday 18th Lat 52° Long -

Fine weather, heading to the N.E. under
short sail middle and latter fresh winds
and fair weather, at 9 A.M. finished boiling
sounds again Lat 54° Long 111° 55'

Saturday July 19th 1845

All these 24 hours, breeze winds and fine
weather, sounds Lat 51° 12' Long 112° 05'

Sunday 20th

Weather, still fine and pleasant, nothing
in sight so far as 7 am Lat 50° 9' N. Attitude

Monday 21st

Still good weather, at 1 P.M. saw whales down
Boat struck two one took the line and went
off got the other one at 6 took to the ship
middle part by heading to the N.E. at daylight
broke up while cutting made rope parted and
made went astern got the heads to the ship and
hoove it in to carry jugged sounds Lat 52° 29' Long 112° 27'

Tuesday 22nd

Winds still blowing strong ship under close reefed
topsails heading to the N.E. middle and latter
part fresh winds employed boiling

Wednesday 23rd Lat 50° 15' Long 112° 14'

Strong winds at 4 P.M. saw whales going quick to
windward, forward but of no avail at dark
came along side a plenty of whales in sight
middle and latter part strong winds some squally
employed boiling Lat 51° 12' Long 112° 05'

Thursday 24th

Ship heading to the S at 9 P.M. finished boiling
the day ends strong trade Lat 45° Long 112° 55'

Friday 25th

Still strong winds at midnight saw a
ship astern at sundown boat ship to the
N.E. sounds fresh winds clear weather

Saturday 26th Lat 50° 17' Long 112° 27'

Strong winds and clear at dark spoke ship
Mary Mitchell of Nant. Capt. Lawrence 36 mo
out 12.15 pm 4.00 whaling sounds strong winds

Sunday 27th Lat 50° 8' Long 112° 12' by line 112° 05'

Strong trades and fair weather, one saw in
sight sounds Lat 44° 43' Long 112° 37'
