Monday 22nd (Oct-1877).
Had strong breezes from the E. all the first part of the day steering South. Mid part wind died out. Latter part breezed again from the Eastward. Caught a porpoise and coursed for Black Fish.

Tuesday 23rd

Had Calms and light baffling airs from all points of the Compass with squalls of rain. saw several sail nothing more of note.

Wednesday 24th

Had Calms and light baffling airs from all points nothing of note this day.

Lat 5° 56.

Thursday 25th

Calms and light airs with frequent rain squalls during the first 9 mid part latter clear overhauled the main top sail haly and made Spungam. saw several sail.

Lat 5° 42.

Long 24° 43.

Friday 26th

Calms and light airs from the S. with frequent squalls of rain. Caught a Black Fish.

To the Equator.

Saturday Oct 27th 1877.

Calms and light airs all this day employed boiling and making Spungam nothing more of note.

Lat 5° 12.

Sunday 28th

Calms all this day with showers of rain.

Lat 5° 07.

Long 24° 15.

Monday 29th

Had Calms and light airs from the S. S. E. all this day steering into the S. W. Mid 9 latter part wind the same with frequent squalls of rain.

Lat 4° 27.

Long 26° 08.

Tuesday 30th

Had fresh breeze from the S. S. E. all this day steering into the S. W. employed making Spungam, and several other jobs. In the evening signalled a French bark bound to the old land.

Lat 3° 22.

Long 26° 17.

Wednesday 31st

Had fresh baffling breezes from the S. W. working to windward. overhauled the main top sail with 2 feet foot hooker saw several sail.

Lat 2° 27.

Long 28° 00.
