

Cruising

Thursday Jan 9th 1879.

Began with strong breeze from the S.W. latter part - Moderated some spoke the dark bounding below nothing more of note

Friday 10th

Moderate breeze from the S.W. all this twenty four hours. Quays bearing 20 miles 5 whales in sight - nothing more of note

Saturday 11th

Began with light air from the S.W. latter part - light breeze from the W. vessel steering S.W. under all sail about 8 P.M. raised the Lucretia & Fish Hawk to windward. Whaling the whales working into the Eastward. Lowered and then waist-hoat struck and the rest chased off without success took the whale alongside and got dinner so ends

Sunday 12th

Wind hauled round to North got our whale in and set the watches. sunset the Jacob Ireland gave Martin. Fish Hawk & Lucretia in sight all with a whale. Quays in sight to leeward. latter part - thick weather and fresh breeze from the W. started then worked nothing more of note

Cruising

Monday Jan 13th 1879

Began with fresh breeze from the Westward with frequent - big squalls employed boiling and broke out - water latter part - freezing

Tuesday 14th

Wind shifted into the S.W. and blowing strong split the gib finished boiling and washed off latter part - blowing a Gale vessel laying easy nothing more of note

Wednesday 15th

Blowing a Gale from the S.W. Mid part - Moderated some run the oil down and got the Decks clear also repaired the gib

Thursday 16th

Wind hauled into the Westward and breezing but the gib nothing more of note

Friday 17th

With strong West-winds Mid part - wind hauled into the S.W. and thick the remainder of the day

Saturday 18th

Blowing from the S.W. latter part - moderated some broke out provisions and water

Lat - 44° 23'
Long - 76° 20'

Sunday 19th

Moderate breeze from the Westward and fog nothing more of note
