

Off Guam Sunday

Monday March 1st 1880
With moderate breeze from
the S.W. gun bearing 20 miles

Tuesday 2nd
With fresh falling winds from
the S.W. Island Santa Clara
at sea from distance about
100 miles. raised a large sperm
whale. lowered the three life
boats and chased one rising
all the daylight - we had
worked the vessel to windward
all night to see what the
morrow was going to be

Wednesday 3rd
With fair weather and moderate
breeze from the S. cruised
around the greater part
of this and but saw
nothing so did advise to
sail and steered into
the Eastward under all
sail

Thursday 4th
With fresh breeze from the
S.W. vessel steering into the
S.W. the greater part of
this day repaired the main
top gallies sail and dried
some of the bone and bunched
it

Friday 5th
With strong breeze from the
S.W. and clear finished bundling
the bone vessel steering into
the Eastward again

Bound in shore

Saturday March 6th 1880
With strong breeze from the S.W. &
vessel steering into the Eastward
all this day scraped & plashed
down

Sunday 7th
With strong South winds vessel
steering into the Eastward
nothing of note occurred

Monday 8th
With strong breeze from the
S.W. vessel heading off
all night and in all day
stowed the upper masts
and crossers. Sibs & shanks
and sorted the boats on upper
craze

Tuesday 9th
With strong breeze from the
S.W. vessel steering into the S.
saw Galapagos Light bearing
S. by E 29 miles tacked into the
S.W.

Wednesday 10th
With moderate breeze from
the S.W. tacked into the S.
about 10 A.M. made the land
wind died out - calm - towed
up to Anchorage and
dropped mud hook about
10 30 P.M.
