

Cruising

Wednesday Nov 24th 1880

With fresh breezes from the W. washed the paint work and scraped the Bone

Thursday 25th

Began with moderate west winds and thick fog about 7 A.M. covered for a Right whale close to the vessel and chased a few rising about fog lifted and wind shifted until the B saw the same whale and got him sunset finished cutting and set the watches

Friday 26th

With strong South winds employed boiling nothing more of note

Saturday 27th

With fresh breezes from the W. to the greater part of this day stowed down and washed ship; saw the Leander to leeward. Water part thick fog

Sunday 28th

With strong S.W. winds and rugged saw several Right whales and Bow Boat went on the whale see the Boat and settled his body head on: boatsteward set an iron into his bonnet and the whale started to windward and run about 8 miles and then drew out: also saw the Leander and other ships and

Monday Nov 29th 1880

With fresh breezes from the S.W. scraped the Bone and chased a Right whale

Tuesday 30th

Moderate rain a Right whale at daylight and covered lost run off him about 10-30 A.M. raised him up again lowered and got him got him in and set the watches also saw the Leander chasing seals

Wednesday Dec 1st 1880

With West winds employed boiling and chasing Right whales saw the Leander and another whaler to windward

Thursday 2nd

With fresh breezes from the W. and S.W. scraped the Bone, chased a Right whale, broke out and got ready to run oil: saw the Leander, boiling and Leander just finished cutting nothing more of note

Friday 3rd

Blowing a Gale from the S.W. with frequent squalls nothing of note occurred this day

Saturday 4th

Blowing a Gale from the S.W. stowed down our oil and washed ship
Lat-46-52 Lon 81-56
