

Off Kuafo

Saturday Nov 13th
With fine weather and high-
air from the C chased
a Humpback but did not
get him

Sunday 14th
With thick weather and
increasing wind from
the W. Mid part wind
and rain. Hatter
part with fresh breezes
from the C and clear.

Monday 15th
With high air from
the C saw Humpback
and camp back.

Tuesday 16th
With moderate breezes from
the C. Mid part - calm
after part breezing from
the S. W. repaired Hatter
top the flag sail

Wednesday 17th
With fresh breezes from
the S. W. spoke the hatter
and J. Howland

Thursday 18th
With strong S. W. winds
and rugged vessel stirring
into the C. & B. C. about
2.30 P. M. raised sperm whales
and lowered J. Howland's
boats came and mated our
Chap boat took our Hatterhead
whale heard the boat and C. & B.

Bound South

Friday Nov 18th 1886
With light air from C. & B. C.
and Hatter daylight raised
sperm whales in company with
J. Howland and our Chap boat
went on again doubled
the craft sent the whale
to (grass) and then chased
another one the remainder
of the day without damage
and caught a board sick and
sore at heart.

Saturday 19th
Wind shifted into the
S. daylight kept J. & B.
about 10 A. M. raised sperm
whales going quick to
windward Hatter and
Chap boat got one got the
whale secure and made
sail and steered W. S. W.
weather thick and rainy
also saw the J. Howland's
boats chasing off

Sunday 20th
Wind shifted into the C
and dropped out - Hatter got
the whale in and started
the works this day with
high air from the C. with rain
saw the J. Howland cutting
a whale

Monday 21st
With fresh breezes from the C.
employed boiling nothing
more of note
