this day begins with fine weather and
light winds from the N lying off
and on at Boratonga at 1 P.M. the
Capt went ashore at 5 P.M. came on
board and brought the skin of a cat
him at 6 P.M. kept off S. E.

N. W. steering S. E. by S with all sail
set nothing in sight so ends the day
