

Remarks On Board Ship Janus of New Bedford

Satter part strong breeze from N.W. with squalls of wind and light drizzling rain and a rugged sea running, at 6 Am were sound and headed to the S.W. set close reefed fore topsail and mainsail.

Lat 40.56 N. Long 35.35 W.

Remarks Friday August 15th.

Light breeze from the N.W. heading to the S.W. set the gill at 4 Am set whole fore and main topsail.

Middle part baffling wind from West to N.W. heading S.W. and N.S.W. Satter part light air baffling heading Westward, set all sail, saw two sails steering Eastward, saw grampuses, employed getting main topsail lifted & try works.

Lat 40.08 N. Long 35.40 W.

Remarks Saturday August 16th.

Light air baffling heading to the N.W. at 7 Am light breeze from N.W. tacked and headed to the S.W. one sail in sight heading Eastward

Middle part light air and calm.

Satter part light air baffling steering Westward employed breaking out for water, saw porpoises, one sail in sight steering Eastward.

Lat 40.03 N. Long 35.22 W.

Remarks Sunday August 17th.

Light air from the South baffling to the S.E. with calms saw porpoises.

Middle part light air from the South steering N by W.

Satter part light air from the South steering N.W. saw two brig steering Eastward at 9 Am boarded one of them a Spanish Brig. Saw porpoises.

Lat 40.00 N. Long 39.37 W.

Remarks Monday August 18th.

Light breeze from the S.W. steering N.W. having fine weather.

Middle part light air from the S.W. baffling Westward heading to the N.W.

Satter part light breeze from West heading N.W. at 9 Am saw sperm whales breaching, making white water and spouting to windward six or seven miles off supposed to be working to the N.W. saw a merchantman steering Eastward.

Lat 40.08 N. Long 38.02 W.

Remarks Tuesday August 19th.

Light and fresh breeze from West the ship working to windward smoky and hazy, saw a yumper breaching to leeward at 4 Pm the wind baffling to the North at 7 Pm light breeze from N.W. tacked and headed to the S.W.

Middle part light breeze from the N.E. the ship lying with the main topsail aback heading to the Northward.

Satter part fresh breeze from the Eastward steering different courses from N.W. to S.W. saw two merchantmen one steering Eastward the other Westward

Lat 40.21 N. Long 38.30 W.

Remarks Wednesday August 20th.

Fresh breeze from the S.E. heading S.S.W. and S.W. saw a bark supposed a whaler heading to the Eastward no top gallant sail set, had some light drizzling rain, at sunset furled the mainsail light sail and double reefed the topsails.

Middle part fresh breeze from the Southward heading to the Westward. Satter part fresh breeze from the South at daylight were sound and headed to the S.E. at 5 Am saw a whaling bark heading Westward supposed to be the George or bark Millwood by their signal, we saw smoky weather, made some sail at 10 Am took in flying jib, & main top gallant sail.

Remarks Thursday August 21st.

Fresh breeze with squalls and light drizzling rain the wind baffling to the Westward, at 3 Am were sound and headed to the S.W. took in some sail, saw a white water, saw porpoises, at sunset the ship heading N.W.

Middle part strong breeze from the Westward the bark on both tacks during the night, with the mainsail hauled up. Satter part strong breeze from West heading N.W. two sails in sight, at 12 Meridian were sound and headed to the S.E. the wind baffling to the Northward, had a few squalls and some rain.

Lat 40.16 N. Long 38.58 W.

Remarks Friday August 22nd.

Strong wind from the N.W. heading to the N.E. at 1 Pm spoke the bark Thomas Winslow of New Bedford Captain Budworth 23 days out clean, has seen whales once, gamed with her until 4 Pm at sunset were sound and headed West took in the fore topsail, rigged.

Middle the same the ship under double reefed topsails, courses and gill.

Satter part fresh breeze from the Northward baffling the ship on both tacks made sail, the evening passed on homophodite brig a whaler heading Westward saw 2 or 3 more sails.

Lat 40.16 N. Long 39.44 W.

Remarks Saturday August 23rd.

Light breeze from the Northward baffling and a rugged sea on the ship steering different courses, saw a white water a long distance off, also
