

Remarks On Board Ship James of New Bedford Mass.

Middle part strong wind from the N.W. steering S.E. The wind moderate at intervals and veering to the Westward gradually at 12 M set whole main topsail, and main top gallant sail.

Latter part strong wind from the Westward with squalls of wind and rain, steering S.E. the wind increasing to a gale. double reefed the main topsail, set the fore and mainsail, but soon took them in again.

Lat 37.23 S. Long 12.45 W.

Remarks Thursday July 16th.

A gale of wind from the Westward steering S.S.E. at 1 Pm had a squall with wind and plenty rain, furled the fore topsail, close reefed the main topsail, and furled the foresail, set the fore staysail and fore spencer, hauled to the wind heading Southward, squally and rainy, at 2 Pm saw the Island Inaccessible to leeward bearing about E.N.E. at 4.30 Pm saw the Island Nightingale.

Middle part the wind veered to the S.W. moderating heading S.S.E. and S.E.

Latter part strong wind from the S.W. heading S.S.E. considerable sea on, made sail gradually, the Island Inaccessible, Nightingale, and Tristan d'Acunha in sight.

Lat 37.50 S. Long 11.52 W.

Remarks Friday July 17th.

Strong wind from the S.W. heading S.S.E. at dusk had all sail set.

Middle part light wind from the S.W. with glass heading S.E. & S.S.E.

Latter part light air and calm, the wind baffling to the North steering S.E. employed breaking out Slops, sugar, Peas, started one bl of Beef and one bl of Pork saw a finback.

Lat 38.10 S. Long 11.13 W.

Remarks Saturday July 18th.

Sight air from the North, baffling steering South saw finbacks.

Middle part fresh breeze from the N.E. steering South under whole topsails and foresail & main top gallant sail.

Latter part fresh from the N.E. steering S.E. and S.S.E. the wind increasing with rain and thick weather, double reefed the topsails, at 11.30 Am saw a ship heading to the N.W.

Captain Joseph H. Cornell, A.D. 1863.

Remarks Sunday July 19th.

Strong breeze from the N.E. with thick rainy weather, at 1 Pm spoke the Ship Josephine of New Bedford Captain Chapman 3 months out sailing, has been here three weeks and got three Whales. The Ship heading to the N.W. at 4 Pm took in sail, down to storm sails, at 7 Pm were round and headed to the S.E.

Middle part the wind veered to the S.W. heading Westward. Latter part strong winds with glass from the S.W. heading Westward, at 11.30 Am were round and headed to the S.E. set the fore.

Lat 39.33 S.

Long 10.30 W.

Remarks Monday July 20th.

Strong wind from the S.W. baffling Southward heading to the S.E. set double reefed fore and main topsail, at 5 Pm were round & headed Westward.

Middle part light wind from the Southward, baffling, the Ship on both tacks during the night.

Latter part light breeze from the S.W. heading to the S.E. at daylight saw South's Island bearing S.S.W. the Ship Josephine close to windward all day, saw a finback.

Lat 39.50 S.

Long 9.48 W.

Remarks Tuesday July 21st.

Light baffling wind from the Westward heading Southward at sunset light breeze from N.W. heading S.W. the Island bearing S.W.

Middle part strong breeze from the N.W. baffling standing off and on at the Island.

Latter part strong wind from the N.W. baffling to the S.W. stood in under the lee of the Island in the evening and sent the boats in, squally and rainy weather, saw several Right Whales, struck a calf to the waist boat, and the Starboard boat struck the cow, the waist boat killed the calf, after the cow was struck, and the Starboard boat dragged from the cow by the line being entangled about the calf while going in its flury. killed another small calf, saw the Josephine take a whale along side, at noon the boats came on board.

Remarks Wednesday July 22nd.

Strong breeze from the S.W. sent the boats in shore again. saw two or three Whales but could not strike them, at sunset the boats came on board. Captain Cornell has informed
