

Remarks On Board Ship Janus of New Bedford, Mass.

Remarks Wednesday November 25th.

Fresh breeze from the N.W. steering Eastward, at 3 Pm spoke the Ship Comodore Morris of Baltimore. Captⁿ Jones 32^h months out with 950 sperm, & 200 of whale oil, at 6 Pm spoke the Bark Blunder of Nantucket Captⁿ Clark 17^h months out with 1100 of sperm & 200 of whale oil, at sunset foggy weather.

Middle part fresh breeze from the Westward heading N.W. at 1 Pm steering S.S.E. Latter part strong breeze from the Westward, heading to the SW thick weather saw a Finback, also a Seal, at 9 Am were round and headed N.E.W.

Lat 45.00 S.

Long 75.50 W.

Remarks Thursday November 26th.

Fresh breeze from the Westward, baffling, at 1 Pm were round and headed S.S.W. saw several Finbacks, at 2 Pm quite clear weather, set more sail, at 7 Pm double reefed the topsails, were round and headed N.E.W.

Middle part light breeze from the Westward, heading N.W.

Latter part fresh breeze from the N.W. steering N.E. all sail set, saw humpbacks at 5 Am fresh breeze from the North with fog and drizzling rainy weather, steering N.W. the wind increasing, furled the light sails,

Remarks Friday November 27th.

Strong wind from the N.W. heading N.W. thick overcast weather. double reefed the topsails, furled fore, mainsail &c.

Middle part moderate gale from N.W. with squalls and rain, heading S.W.

Latter part strong wind from the N.W. heading to the SW thick and misty weather, set the foresail, and close reefed fore and mizzen topsails

Remarks Saturday November 28th.

Light breeze from the N.W. baffling, heading from S.W. to W. with a heavy swell from Westward. The Ship under double reefed topsails fore & courses, thick fog and rainy weather, at 5 Pm took in sail to a close reefed main topsail, and storm sails, the wind increasing to a gale.

Middle part at 8 Pm the wind veered to the S.W. in a swell, were round and headed to the N.W. the wind baffling Westward, blowing a moderate gale with squalls.

Latter part strong wind from the West heading N.W. to N.W. the wind baffling, with squalls, the Ship under double reefed topsails fore & courses, saw Finbacks,

Remarks Sunday November 29th.

Light wind from the Westward, baffling, heading N.W. with considerable swell found the larboard bowsprit shroud parted.

Middle part light wind from Westward, baffling, heading Northward. Latter part fresh breeze from the Westward, with fog squalls, saw three fishing Barks, to windward, saw two Right Whales, one with Hump back, lowered without success. The whales were going to windward, saw one Bark cutting a whale, passed the Bark D. Franklin of New Bedford.

Remarks Monday November 30th.

Light breeze from the Westward, saw Finbacks, saw the Bark D. Franklin to leeward cutting a whale, at 6 Pm spoke the Bark Circle of New Bedford Captain Jennings, 6 month out with 550 of Oil, 55 of it sperm, the Bark Perry^m Cummings was in sight this morning, saw another Bark this afternoon.

Middle part light breeze from the Westward, the Ship on both tacks.

Latter part light breeze from Westward, baffling to the North, heading from S.W. to N.W. saw a small Right Whale going Southward quite quick breaching, saw three sails, had considerable rain, at 9 Am the wind increasing took in the light sails, at 10 Am quite clear with a strong breeze, heading N.W.

Remarks Tuesday December 1st.

Strong wind from the N.W. baffling, heading from N.W. to S.W. rainy weather, the wind increasing, shortened sail, at 7 Pm the Ship under close reefed fore and main topsails, and storm sails.

Middle part moderate gale from N.W. heading Southward.

Latter part the same, heading to the N.W. set the foresail and close reefed fore topsail,

Remarks Wednesday December 2nd.

Strong wind from the N.W. heading to the N.W. with a rugged sea on, at 7 Pm the Ship under double reefed topsails, fore and foresail, heading N.W. to W.

Middle part strong wind from N.W. baffling Westward, heading Northward. Latter part moderate gale from the N.W. heading to the SW, the wind strong and baffling.

Lat 44.18 S.

Remarks Thursday December 3rd.

A moderate gale from the N.W. heading to the N.W. with a rugged sea on, saw a Finback.

Middle part moderating the wind baffling to the N.W.

at 11 Pm were round and headed to the N.W. set close reefed fore and mizzen topsails
