

Remarks On Board Ship Janus Of New Bedford, Mass.

Middle part fresh breeze from the South, the ship working to windward.
 Latter part light breeze from the South, baffling to the SW, cruising off Hango.
 misty weather, the Island in sight, saw 3 Barks to windward, 2 of which spoke.

Remarks Thursday December 24th.

Light breeze from the SW, misty & hazy, steering different courses, three sails in sight.
 at sunset shortened sail, misty and hazy weather.

Middle part light breeze from the SW, the ship working to windward.
 Latter part light breeze from the Westward, steering different courses, Southward, saw
 jinkback, three sails in sight, & the Island Hango, at 11 Am came in thick fog.

Remarks Friday December 25th.

Light breeze from the WNW, steering different courses, misty and hazy weather.

Middle part light breeze from the WNW, heading to the SW, hazy.
 Latter part light breeze from the Westward, steering different courses, hazy
 weather, clear at intervals one sail in sight at 9.30 Am gaining with the
 Bark Mary & Susan of New Bedford, Captain Cleveland about 41 months at 1600 of Shamocks.

Remarks Saturday December 26th.

Light breeze from the WSW, heading Southward, gaining foggy weather clear.
 at intervals, received on board 3000 of Prime Pork, and 24 bundles of
 Iron hoop, saw the Bark Hecla to windward, also saw Blackfish.

Middle part light Westerly breeze the ship on both tack during the night.
 Latter part light breeze from the WNW, heading to the SW, hazy weather had rain.
 steamed away the Pork, stowed one 100 of it, at 10 Am were round and headed to
 the North, saw Blackfish working to windward, spoke the Bark Hecla.

Salt 43.45 S. Long 75.06 W.

Remarks Sunday December 27th.

Light breeze from the WNW, steering to the NE, quite clear weather at 3 Pm
 saw the Island Hango, ahead, at 4 Pm heading to the SW, saw the breaker.

Middle part fresh breeze from the WNW, heading SW.
 Latter part strong breeze from the WNW, baffling to the SW, heading SW to SE, hazy
 weather, with some rain, the ship under double reefed topsails, jib and courses.

Salt 44.30 S. Long 76.21 W.

Remarks Monday December 28th.

Strong breeze from the SW, at 1 Pm were round and headed WNW to NW, at
 sunset the ship under whole topsails, courses, jib and spanker.

Captain Joseph H. Cornell, A.S. 1863, & 1864.

Middle part fresh breeze from the SW, heading NW by W, at midnight
 the wind veered to Westward, were round and headed SSW.

Latter part strong wind from the WNW, heading to the SW, thick and wet
 weather, at 10 Am furled the light sails, and double reefed the topsails, the foot rope
 parted to the jib, and split the sail the whole length, rough weather.

Salt 44.31 S. Long 77.48 W.

Remarks Tuesday December 29th.

Strong wind from the Westward baffling to the SW, heading SSW, to SE, under
 double reefed topsails, courses & storm sails.

Middle part strong wind from SW, heading SE, took in the mainsail, &c.
 Latter part strong wind from the SW, heading SE, at 8 Am were round and
 headed WNW, set the mainsail &c, bent another jib.

Salt 45.29 S. Long 77.49 W.

Remarks Wednesday December 30th.

Strong breeze from the SW, heading WNW, saw jinkback, saw a merchantman
 steering Northward, at sunset set more sail.

Middle part strong breeze from the SW, heading W by N, squally.
 Latter part strong wind from the SW, baffling Westward with squalls, heading
 WNW, saw jinkback, two sails in sight, one a merchantman steering Northward,
 double reefed the topsails, set down the main spencer for repair, at 10.30 Am
 spoke the Bark Symp of New Bedford, Captain Robinson, 12000 lbs of coal.

Salt 44.10 S. Long 78.41 W.

Remarks Thursday December 31st.

Strong wind from the WSW, heading South, finished the main spencer &
 bent it, at sunset squally, the ship under close reefed topsails, jib & storm sails.

Middle part a moderate gale from WSW, with squalls, heading South,
 Latter part, a gale from the SW, with squalls, the ship heading WNW under
 close reefed topsails, spencer, and stay sails.

Salt 44.24 S. Long 78.41 W.

Remarks Friday January 1st 1864.

A gale of wind from the SW, heading WNW, with heavy squalls, saw
 a merchant Bark steering Northward, with main top yellowed sail set.

Middle part a gale from the SW, with squalls, heading West,
 Latter part a moderate gale from the South, heading W by S, saw jinkback.

Salt 43.38 S. Long 79.23 W.

Remarks Saturday January 2nd.

A moderate gale from the South heading WSW, and W by S.
