

Remarks On Board Ship Janus Of New Bedford, Mass.

Middle part light breeze from the North steering E. N. E.
Satter part wind the same, steering E. N. E. fog, saw porpoise, caught one.

Remarks Friday January 22nd.

Light breeze from the NW, steering E. N. E. all sail set. Thick fog.
Middle part light breeze from the Westward steering different courses to
the N. E. fog weather, at midnight furled the light sails, steering N. N. E.
Satter part fresh breeze the wind veered to the NW, heading N. N. E. Thick weather.

Remarks Saturday January 23rd.

Strong breeze from the NW, baffling Westward, heading N. N. W. to S. W. with fog &
light rain, at 4 M. clear weather, wind N. W. heading Southward, took in some sail.
Middle part strong wind from SW, increasing with squalls, steering different courses.
Satter part A gale from the South, steering N. N. E. saw two sails, whales heading Eastward
at 6 Am steering N. W. squally, fore and main top gallant sail set.

Long 76, 01 W.

Remarks Sunday January 24th.

A gale from the South, steering N. N. W. under whole topsails & fore sail, ran new wheel ropes.
Middle part moderating, steering N. N. W. at midnight set fore & main top gallant sails.
Satter part strong breeze from the South, steering N. N. W. all sail set.

Satt 40, 45 S.

Long 76, 02 W.

Remarks Monday January 25th.

Fresh breeze from the South, steering North.
Middle part light breeze from the South, steering North.
Satter part light air from the South, steering N. N. E. employed repairing the
main topmast stay sail & fitting a stay for the sail, trying the bone.

Satt 39, 03 S.

Long 75, 03 W.

Remarks Tuesday January 26th.

Light breeze from the Southward steering N. N. E. and N. E. sent down the fore
spence and its gaff, put up the stay and bent the main topmast stay rail, stowed
away the bone, saw a humpback, at sunset saw the land ahead.

Middle part light breeze from Southward steering N. E. towards Mocha
Satter part light breeze steering in for the Island Mocha, the coast of Chili
in sight, saw several humpbacks, at 10 Am strong breeze, at 10.30 Am the Captain
went ashore at the Island Mocha with two boats. The ship standing off & on
at the landing on the N. E. side of the Island, at 11 Am double reefed the topsails.

Remarks Wednesday January 27th.

Strong wind from the S. S. E. standing off & on at the Island Mocha, under
double reefed topsails, with a rugged sea and a heavy breaker and surf at the land-
ing place, received on board about 14 barrels of Irish potatoes, at 5.30 Pm. The Captain
came on board, two Portuguese deserted here, while on duty, one named Frank, the other Rodriguez,
at sunset the ship steering NW, under whole topsails and fore sail.

Middle part strong wind from S. S. E. steering NW.

Satter part strong wind from the S. S. E. steering NW, and NW by W. put up a top
gallant studding sail fore main top gallant stay sail, the ship carrying all sail.

Satt 36, 15 S.

Long 75, 29 W.

Remarks Thursday January 28th.

Strong wind from the S. S. E. steering NW and N. W. all sail set.
Middle part strong wind from the Southward, steering N. N. W.
Satter part strong breeze from the Southward steering N. N. W. and N. E. by N. at 4 Am saw the
Island Juan Fernandez ahead, made an alteration in the main topmast stay sail.

Satt 34, 00 S.

Long 75, 28 W.

Remarks Friday January 29th.

Fresh breeze from the South steering N. E. for the Island, saw a merchantman, and
two whaling boats, at sunset the ship abreast of the settlement, were round
and headed East, the wind blew.

Middle part light breeze from the South, standing off & on at the Island.
Satter part light breeze baffling with calm, sent a raft of cash ashore
about 40 barrels for fresh water, at noon took the water aboard.

Remarks Saturday January 30th.

Light air & calm, sent two boats in fishing, started 2 blk of Pork & 1 blk of Beef.
Middle part light air and calm, going with bark Roscoe.
Satter part light breeze from the West, in the morning sent in 4 boats to get wood
sent ashore 1 blk of Molasses, some cloth &c. received on board 3 cord of wood.

Remarks Sunday January 31st.

Light baffling breeze from the West with calm, sent two boats in fishing, delivered to
Bark Roscoe of New Bedford, Captain Macomber 2000 gallons Molasses
in barrels, received on board 10 empty barrels, in return for the barrels, 1 barrel hoops.

Middle part light air from the NW, heading Northward.
Satter part light air from Westward, steering N. N. W. The Island in sight, saw grampuses.
