

Remarks on Board Ship James of New Bedford, Mass.

NW spoke Bark Martha Captain Thomas, also Bark Massachusetts of New Bedford, Captain Green, came with the latter.

Sat 69.36 N. Long 173.16 W.

Remarks Friday July 22nd.

Light wind from the SE, cruising along the ice, several sail in sight.

Middle part light wind from SE, cruising along the ice, at 11 Am nearly calm, at 2 Pm fog with light breeze from NW heading Westward, with main topsail aback.

Latter part light breeze from NW heading Westward along the ice, one ship in sight saw a dead walrus saved the flesh, sounded in 25 fathoms water.

Sat 69.40 N. Long 173.09 W.

Remarks Saturday July 23rd.

Light breeze from NW heading Westward along the ice, saw considerable drift wood, at 4 Pm steering South, plenty ice in sight.

Middle part light & calm at 12 M, light air from NW steering to the SE.

Latter part light breeze from the SE heading Southward, at 10.45 Am tacked and headed Eastward, 4 sail in sight, at noon spoke Ship George Howland, of New Bedford, Captain Jones, thin ice made during the night.

Sat 69.21 N.

Remarks Sunday July 24th.

Fresh breeze from the SE heading Eastward, gaming with the Ship George Howland, and Bark Thomas Diebason of New Bedford.

Middle part fresh breeze from S.E. heading Eastward, at 11 Pm heading Southward, thick fog.

Latter part fresh breeze from the SE, steering different courses, the ice and several sails in sight, thick misty weather.

Remarks Monday July 25th.

Fresh breeze from S.E. heading Southward, thick and wet weather.

Middle part fresh breeze from S.E. heading S.E. at 11 Am steering NW & W.

Latter part light breeze from S.E. steering different courses, plenty ice and several sail in sight, at noon spoke Bark Lionella of New Bedford Captain Thomas, with the Small Fox on board, saw a large killer.

Remarks Tuesday July 26th.

Fresh breeze from the S.E. The Ship, working to windward, saw plenty ice.

Middle part fresh breeze from S.E. baffling Southward heading Eastward, all sail set, the wind increased, at 3 Am the Ship, under close reefed main topsail and storm sail.

Captain Joseph H. Cornell, A.D. 1864.

Latter part A moderate gale from NW heading to the SW at 7 Am were round and headed N.E. several sail in sight, set close reefed fore topsail.

Remarks Wednesday July 27th.

Fresh breeze from Westward heading NW, saw plenty ice, at 3 Pm steering S.E. & S. tacked sail, at 3.30 Pm saw a bowhead going toward the ice, lowered without success.

Middle part light baffling breeze from Southward, heading Eastward at 1 Am tacked to Westward, several sail in sight.

Latter part fresh breeze from South heading NW and N.E. started 2 bl of Pork, and 1 bl of Beef, at noon saw plenty ice.

Sat 69.27 N.

Long 173.13 W.

Remarks Thursday July 28th.

Fresh breeze from South, steering N.E. the wind varied to Westward, steering to the S.E.

Middle part fresh breeze from S.E. heading S.E. along the ice, saw a number of walrus.

Latter part fresh breeze from Westward, baffling, steering different courses from S.E. to N.E. & W. saw two devil fish and some walrus, lowered without success, saw plenty ice, at noon saw the land to Southward, and one sail, had a few snow squall.

Remarks Friday July 29th.

Strong wind from the NW, with snow squall, steering N.E. & W. raised weather.

Middle part strong wind from the NW heading N.E. with snow squall.

Latter part strong wind from the NW with snow squall, the ship heading N.E. several sail in sight, at 11 Pm spoke Bark Washington of New Bedford, Captain Willard.

Remarks Saturday July 30th.

Strong wind from the NW heading N.E. gaming, several sail in sight, had a few snow squall.

Middle part fresh breeze from NW baffling heading Northward, at midnight saw the Eastern shore of the Arctic Ocean, had some snow squall.

Latter part fresh breeze from NW heading N.E. at 7 Am, Cape Sirbuore bearing East by compass, had some fog squall with snow, at 11.30 Am spoke Bark Ontario.

Long 166.04 W.

Remarks Sunday July 31st.

Light breeze from the NW heading N.E. with fog squall, and snow, bent the cable and got the small anchor off the bow, one sail in sight, at 3.30 Pm spoke the Bark J.D. Thompson, of New London, Captain Brown.

Middle part fresh breeze from the NW baffling heading Westward.

Latter part fresh breeze from the NW steering Westward along through the
