Remarks Thursday March 9th.

Light breeze from E.S.E. heading N.E. saw a school of grampuses at sunset furled mainsail.
 Middle part light breeze from E.S.E. baffling Eastward heading to the N.E.
 Latter part light breeze from E.N.E. baffling heading to S.E. one Brig in sight.
 Lat 34.48 S. Long 49.43 W.

Remarks Friday March 10th.

Light breeze from the East baffling heading to the S.E. saw grampuses.
 at sunset shortened sail wore round and headed N.W.E.
 Middle part light breeze from N.E. heading E.S.E. saw a merchantman.
 Latter part light breeze from N.E. heading N.W.W. saw plenty grampuses breaching.
 employed making small rope out of an old catkin fall.
 Lat 34.42 S. Long 49.52 W.

Remarks Saturday March 11th.

Fresh breeze from the N.E. heading N.W.W. saw one sail, steering South-
 ward, saw grampuses breaching, at sunset shortened sail.
 Middle part fresh breeze from N.E. the ship on both tacks during the night.
 Latter part strong breeze from the N.E. heading N.W.W. saw two sail.
 Lat 33.54 S. Long 50.31 W.

Remarks Sunday March 12th.

Strong breeze from the N.E. heading N.W.W. wet the oil, saw grampuses.
 one sail in sight at sunset wore round and headed E.S.E. furled gill & mainsail.
 Middle part strong breeze from N.W.E. heading Eastward.
 Latter part had a rain squall from the N.W. shower in the morning with lightning.
 at 9 Am. light breeze from N.E. heading N.W.W. saw a brig and a few turtle.
 Lat 33.50 S. Long 50.51 W.

Remarks Monday March 13th.

Light breeze from the N.W.W. baffling heading Westward, 3 sail in sight. took in sail.
 Middle part light breeze from the N.W.W. baffling Westward heading Westward.
 Latter part fresh breeze from West baffling to S.W. steering to the N.E. employed
 making rope, saw a steamer last night, saw grampuses breaching & playing, saw two sail.
 Lat 33.45 S. Long 51.02 W.

Remarks Tuesday March 14th.

Fresh breeze from the S.W. steering E.S.E. at sunset furled mainsail & gill & topsail.
 33.04 S. Middle part light breeze from the S.W. steering E.N.E. Brig & Dick.
 Latter part light breeze from the Southward veering to the S.E. steering
 E.N.E. two sail in sight at 9 Am. boarded the Bark from Dawson.
 of New Bedford Capt. Little, 8 months out with 300 bl of sperm oil.

Remarks Wednesday March 15th.

Light air from Eastward heading N.E. at sunset the ship under close reefed fore & main topsail.
 Middle part baffling breeze from the N.E. with rain heading Northward.
 Latter part strong wind from the N.E. heading North & N.W. squally and rainy weather.
 made and took in sail, saw one sail, at noon the wind increasing with heavy rain.

Remarks Thursday March 16th.

Strong wind from the N.E. heading N.W. with plenty rain put the ship under storm sail.
 the wind veered to the N.W. and moderated, cleared up some, at sunset wore round and
 headed to the N.E. with drizzling rain, set the gill & double reefed fore & main, topsail.
 Middle part the wind veered to the Westward heading Northward.
 Latter part strong wind from the West, with heavy squalls heading N.W.W. at 11 Am.
 steering N.E. under double reefed fore and main, topsail, and storm sail.
 Lat 31.35 S. Long 48.15 W.

Remarks Friday March 17th.

A strong gale from the West at noon took in fore topsail and gill to the wind heading S.S.W.
 close reefed the main topsail, at 5 Pm. saw a sail, at 6 Pm. signalled a Brazilian Brig steering to the N.E.
 Middle part moderating, the wind veered to S.S.W. heading South to S.E. & S.
 Latter part strong wind from S.S.W. heading S.E. & S. a large sea on, made sail gradually.
 Lat 32.14 S. Long 47.32 W.

Remarks Saturday March 18th.

Fresh breeze from the South baffling, with a rough sea, heading S.E. & S. unbent the
 all main, topsail and bent the other one, at sunset furled the courses & double reefed the topsail.
 Middle part light breeze from the South heading E.S.E.
 Latter part light breeze from the South heading E.S.E. employed repairing
 the main topsail, saw grampuses, one sail in sight.
 Lat 32.16 S. Long 46.32 W.

Remarks Sunday March 19th.

Light breeze from the South heading E.S.E. wet the oil at 3 Pm. spoke
 Bark Cornelia of New Bedford Capt. Luce 9 months out & 300 bl of sperm oil.
 Middle part light breeze from the S.E. heading S.S.W.
 Latter part light breeze from S.E. heading to the S.W. three sail in sight, saw a ship
 with three masts set, maneuvering, lying with major topsail aback, &c. at 3 Pm. saw
 a boat from Bark Cornelia, go on board of her, American men of war, supposed to be Ensign.
 Lat 32.30 S. Long 46.34 W.

Remarks Monday March 20th.

Light breeze from the East steering S.S.W. at 2 Pm heading S.E. & S. saw 3 sail.
