

Ship Jasper S. Raymond Master

Friday October the 13th
Light winds at E. N. E. steering S. W. by S
under all sail, at 4 P. M. Long by Chro.
13° 40' W. one ship in sight, Middle
and latter parts fresh winds from N. E.

Saturday October the 14th
Fresh winds from N. E. steering S. S. W.
at 4 P. M. Long by Chro. 13° 47' W. Middle
and latter parts much the same

Sunday October the 15th
Fine breezes from N. E. under all sail
steering S. S. W. at 4 P. M. Long by Chro.
13° 39' W. at 4 P. M. took all the light
sails, and left too to the Eastward, finding
the Isle of Sol to bear S. by E. dist. 10 Leagues
at 3.30 more to the N. W. at 6 P. M.
made all sail steering South

Monday October the 16th
Fresh Trades from N. E. steering S. S. W.
until 4 P. M. then S. W. till 6. then
more too heading N. by W. under the
Top Sails, at 8 P. M. made all sail
steering South, at noon passed between
A. Jago, and Fogo, steering S. S. W.

Tuesday October the 17th
Fresh trades from N. E. steering S. by W.
at 4 P. M. Long by Chro. 13° 56' W. Fogo
bearing 14.16 miles dist. Middle and latter
parts fresh trades from N. E.
steering S. by W. Lat. 0° 13' 10"

from the Cape de Verde to the Indian Ocean

Wednesday October the 18th
Commences light trades from N. E.
steering South and S. by E. Long by Chro.
13° 46' W. employed fitting rigging and
painting Boats, nothing to be seen Middle
and latter parts light winds and calms steering
South, employed fitting rigging Lat 0° 12' 05" N.

Thursday October the 19th
Commences with light winds and calms
heading South, Long by Chro. 13° 40' W.
by 2 and 3 13° 14' W. Middle part light winds
and calms latter parts thick cloudy weather
with heavy squalls of wind and rain, steering
from South to South S. W. Lat by act. 11. 13. 42"

Friday October the 20th
Commences with thick squally weather from
N. E. steering S. S. W. all the light sails in
Middle and latter parts light winds
and calms from every point in the compass
with heavy showers of rain, one ship
sight saw some Grand Porpoises

Saturday October the 21st
Commences thick cloudy weather with squalls
and rain steering South under all
sail, Middle part fine breezes from N. E.
latter part light winds and squally weather
at 9 P. M. looked for Black Fish, but got
none. They were so mild, at 8 P. M. passed
one ship under our lee heading to the
Northward, shoal the Dutch flag
