

Remarks on board Ship John from New Bedford towards
 Remarks on board Thursday July 7th 1835
 These 24 hours commence with light breeze and
 hazy lying between Hyab and Pico waiting for
 recruits Captain and our boats land on shore at
 5 P.M. the recruits came along side at the same time
 Captain and crew came on board took them on
 board and stood out S.W. with a light breeze
 from S at 10 P.M. wind changed to E all sail
 set standing S.E. Middle and latter part
 the same saw one Finback Whale. All hands
 employed in securing recruits. So ends this day

Latitude Obs 38° 00'

Remarks on board Friday July 8th 1835
 These 24 hours commence with strong breezes from
 East and clear weather all sail set standing off S.E.
 at 5 P.M. tacked to the S.W. at 7 took in topsails
 sails and took on reef in the topsails Middle and
 latter part wind and weather the same at 9 P.M.
 tacked to the S.E. at 4 made all sail at 8 tacked
 to the South at 12 M Pico bore S.W. distant
 estimated at 20 miles So ends this day

Latitude Obs 38° 04'

Remarks on board Saturday July 9th 1835
 These 24 hours commence with strong breezes from East
 standing by the wind S.W. at 5 P.M. tacked
 to the South spoke Brigues Marcella of New Bedford
 no Cit. At 7 took in sail to cloudy sky. Topsails and
 Stowsails. Middle strong winds and cloudy at 10
 took in fore and main topsails and at 3 P.M.
 set them again and tacked to the North at 5 set main
 jib and spanker at 8 tacked to S.E. the Marcella in
 sight to the larboard at 9 tacked to the North at 11
 the Peak of Pico bore S.W. distant 20 miles
 So ends this day

Cruising about the Western Islands Thomas Howland Master

Remarks on board Sunday July 10th 1835
 These 24 hours commence with strong winds from E.S.E.
 and cloudy employed in ships duty. Ship under double
 reef Topsails standing by the wind to the E. on our tack
 and S on the other. The Marcella in sight to the larboard
 At 7 P.M. took in sail for the night Middle and latter
 part squally at daylight set her up Topsails main
 jib and spanker At 5 P.M. wind changed to S.E. by S
 - latter part strong breezes and squally standing by the
 wind S.E. for St. Michaels

So ends this 24 hours

Latitude Obs 38° 18'

Remarks on board Monday July 11th 1835
 These 24 hours commence with strong winds from E.S.E.
 Ship standing to the S.E. under double reef. Topsails at
 7 P.M. took in sail for the night wind hauled to S.E. by S
 Middle the same at 4 P.M. made sail at 5 saw St.
 Michaels bearing E. At 11 tacked to the S.W. the Marcella
 still in sight. At 12 St. Michaels bore E distant 10
 miles. Saw several Schooners and other small vessels

Remarks on board Tuesday July 12th 1835
 These 24 hours commence with strong winds from S.E.
 and cloudy weather Middle light breezes and clear
 weather at sunset took in sail for the night at 4
 am made sail nearly calm At 9 A.M. saw sperm
 whales lowered the boats and chased but got none
 St. Michaels bearing E.S.E. distant 15 miles
 So ends this 24 hours
