Sunday Jan 24<sup>th</sup> 1858

Comes in with fine weather and moderate Breeze from S.W. the Bark steering N.E. saw plenty of Porpoises and the Small Fry  
Lat 34.30<sup>s</sup> Long 2.46<sup>w</sup>

Monday Jan 25<sup>th</sup>

This day commences with light airs from the Northward and Westward the Bark steering E.S.E. middle and latter part much the same saw nothing of any importance shifted the fore and main topsails hove out water & several other jobs  
Lat 34.53<sup>s</sup> Long 2.49<sup>w</sup>

Tuesday Jan 26<sup>th</sup>

Comes in with light Breezes from S.W. the Ship steering to the South East middle part hauled round to the Southward saw a Ship steering to the E.N.E. showing Dutch colors  
Lat 33.40<sup>s</sup> Long 2.50<sup>East</sup>

Wednesday Jan 27<sup>th</sup>

This day comes in with light Breezes from the E.N.E. middle and latter part nearly calm employed painting Boats & went down the fore top gallant mast and fitted Cross trees for it. Saw nothing but porpoises a Ship in sight steering to the South. Captain Baker sick with the Dysentery

Thursday Jan 28<sup>th</sup>

Comes in with fine weather and light Breezes the Bark steering S.E. middle and latter part moderate saw nothing employed painting to work on rigging & Sundry Jobs  
Lat 34.11<sup>s</sup> Long 2.53<sup>East</sup>

Friday Jan 29<sup>th</sup>

This day fine weather and moderate Breeze from the S.W. the Bark steering N.E. saw Killas & porpoises. Employed painting to work on rigging &c  
Lat 34.55<sup>s</sup> Long 4.18<sup>East</sup>

Saturday Jan 30<sup>th</sup>

These twenty four hours fine weather and pleasant Breeze from the North middle and latter part much the same saw nothing, Employed painting Boats, Spare Spars &c  
Lat 34.55<sup>s</sup> Long 6.47<sup>E</sup>

Sunday Jan 31<sup>st</sup> 1858

Comes in with strong Breeze from N.W. which increased to a smart gale and shifted to the Westward the Bark steering S.E. under double Reef Tilt and mainsail furled saw porpoises  
Lat 36.11<sup>s</sup> Long 10.08

Monday February 1<sup>st</sup>

Comes in with Fresh Breezes from the Westward the Ship steering S.E. middle and latter part more moderate turned out the reefs and set all sail. a Brig in sight steering East saw porpoises furbacks  
Lat 36.20<sup>s</sup> Long 12.50<sup>East</sup>

Tuesday Feb 2<sup>nd</sup>

This day comes in with moderate breeze from N.W. the Ship steering S.E. saw nothing met even a Goney, employed in Ship's duty  
Lat 36.45<sup>s</sup> Long 15.14<sup>E</sup>

Wednesday Feb 3<sup>rd</sup>

These twenty four hours light Westly winds and a heavy swell from the Westward the Bark steering S.E. saw nothing but Porpoises and the Small Fry  
Lat 37.10<sup>s</sup> Long 11.55<sup>E</sup>

Thursday Feb 4<sup>th</sup>

Comes in with light air from S.W. the Ship steering S.E. middle and latter part calm saw furbacks and porpoises employed painting Boats and Sundry jobs  
Lat 36.21<sup>s</sup> Long 19.12<sup>East</sup>

Friday Feb 5<sup>th</sup>

These twenty four hours fine weather and light Breeze from the Northward the Bark steering S.E. saw Grampuses and furbacks employed cooping the pipes of Broad between decks  
Lat 37.44<sup>s</sup> Long 20.15<sup>E</sup>

Saturday Feb 6<sup>th</sup>

Comes in with fine weather and moderate breezes from the North the Ship steering S.E. saw any quantity of small fry such as Killas, Grampuses and porpoises, but nothing of any importance, hove out water in fore hold
