

Friday March 17th Commences with a light breeze and rainy weather bearing N. W., at 3 p. m. double the top sails, spoke the Ship Hector of New Bedford 15 mts out. 400 bbls of and the Ship Napoleon of New York 1300 bbls. of and 500 bbls. of. Middle part made sail, steering S. E. and very rainy. Lat. 34° 10' S.

Saturday March 18th Commences with a light breeze and rainy steering S. E. with all sail out at 4 p. m. the wind hauled to the S. E. heading E. N. E. - Middle part heading from E. N. E. to E. and very rainy - Latter part took Ship, heading S. employed in various ways

Sunday March 19th Light breeze and thick rainy weather heading S. - Middle part pleasant weather, heading from S. to S. E. - Latter part the same. Lat 35° 41' S. Long 80° 00' W.

Monday March 20th Commences with a light breeze from the E. and fine pleasant weather, heading from S. by W. to S. E. - Middle part the same - Latter part saw some Blackfish and a sail - Lat. 37° 22' S. - Long. 80° 24' W.

Tuesday March 21st Light wind and pleasant weather heading S. by E., at Sunset took Ship heading N. E. by N. Middle and Latter part the same. Lat. 37° 08' S. - Long. 79° 19' W.

Wednesday March 22nd Light wind and pleasant weather heading E., employed in various ways - Middle part steering E. by S. - Latter part the same, spoke the bark Harvest of Fair Haven, steam. Lat. 37° 00' S. - Long. 77° 25' W.

Thursday March 23rd Light wind and pleasant weather, steering E. by S., saw the Ship George of New Bedford, steam - Middle part the same - Latter part the wind N. W. steering E. by N., one sail in sight - Lat. 37° 17' S.

Friday March 24th Light wind from the N. with thick foggy weather steering E. N. E., one sail in sight employed in various ways - Middle part hauled a back the main top sail, heading E. N. E. - Latter part made sail, with thick rainy weather spoke the Ship Robert Edwards of New Bedford, she got one Humpback and some Blackfish since we saw her last

Saturday March 25th Strong wind and thick rainy weather, heading E. N. E., saw some hump backs, at 4 p. m. double reefed the top sails, took Ship and fished the main sail saw the Coast of Chile, at Sunset took in the jib and spraker, heading W. N. W. Middle part the same - Latter part saw a Ship and made sail heading E. N. E., saw 1000 of Humpbacks and one sail, very foggy. Lat 37° 21' S.
