At two o'clock we ship to the southern
and eastern continue to blow strong through
the day at sundown took in the foresail
continue to blow heavy through the night so ends

Remarks on board Tuesday July the 12th 1857

This day commenced with a moderate gail from
the southern and squally wither stood in most
heavy this forenoon latitude 31° 26' longitude 50° 20'
made the small heads this afternoon at four o'clock
began to moderate some heads to the surface
thru the day and night had a strong breeze
thru the night so ends

Remarks on board Wednesday July the 13th 1857

This day commenced with a strong breeze
from south south east and pleasant wither
made sail and left off with east by
north men employed in ordinary ships
duties latitude 32° 06' longitude 49° 47'
at one o'clock left to the wind to the
eastward saw a sail steering to the eastward
saw gunpowder at four o'clock backed ship
heads south west at sundown took in
sail had a fine breeze thru the night
and good wither so ends

Remarks on board Thursday July the 14th 1857

This day commenced with a fresh breeze
from south south west and pleasant wither
made sail men employed making out
for water and small stores latitude
31° 56' longitude 50° 20' at three o'clock
backed ship to the eastward men employ
in ordinary ships duties this afternoon
at sundown backed ship to the westward
and took in sail saw nothing south

Remarks heads to the surface the four part
of the night better part to the eastward
with a strong breeze so ends

Remarks on board Friday July the 15th 1857

This day commenced with a strong breeze
from south south west and squally wither
set the jib and mainsail and backed ship
to the westward at eleven o'clock the *Burgin*
Schoon of Westport spoke us and called in
speak along side and got this
little latitude 31° 42' longitude 50° 20' at
one o'clock took in the jib and
mainsail then on a longer at sun
down took in the foresail and were
round to the surface wither backed had
hard down the hatches made a squall
gail had it away thru the night at
four o'clock took in the foresail blew
heavy so ends

Remarks on board Saturday July the 16th 1857

This day commenced with a moderate gail
from south south west and thick and
sandy wither got in latitude continue
to blow heavy thru the day at sundown began
to moderate a little but left in rain
at eight o'clock began to blow heavy gail
with heavy squalls heads to the southern and
eastward all these forty four hours so ends

Remarks on board Sunday July the 17th 1857

This day commenced with a gail from south
south west and very much squally wither at
seven o'clock saw a brig lying two heads
to the westward at eleven o'clock cleared up
