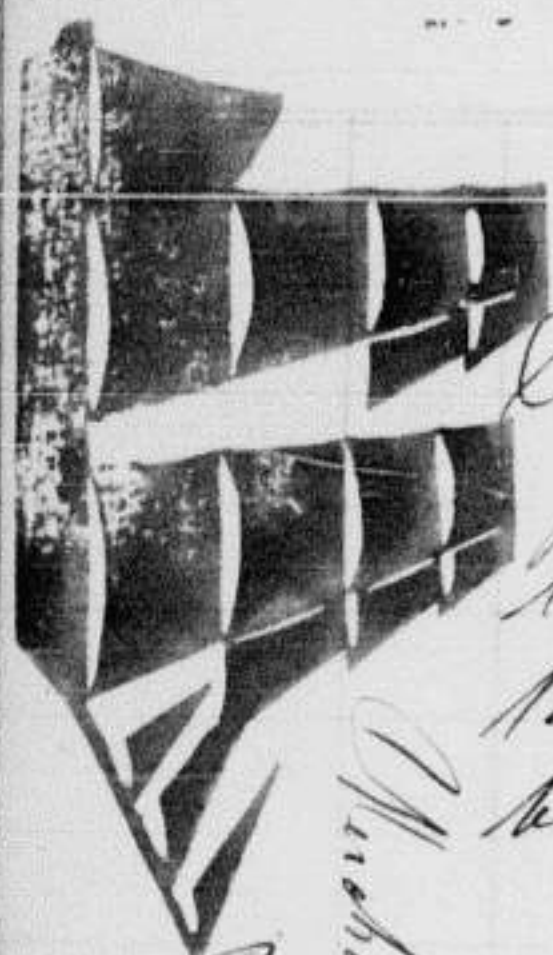


Brig Kate Cory



Saw a Brig sailing to the southward and
perhaps at sundown took in sail headed
to the eastward the head part of the night
later part to the westward had a light
breeze so was

Remarks on board Tuesday August the 30th 1859

This day commenced with a light breeze
from the southward and fine weather set
all sail and were under to the eastward
at ten o'clock raised anchor and bore
the laborer and went to boat but did not
get away at seven o'clock on board latitude
36.50 longitude 44.41 nothing going on
worth remark at sundown took in the
light sail headed south east then
the night so was

Remarks on board August the 31st 1859

This day commenced with a fine breeze
from south west and fine weather set
all sail and were off east catched a
porpoise latitude 36.42 no longitude saw
a sail steering south east under
all sail, at sundown took in sail
board by blackbirds that did not get
on it being late had a fresh breeze then
the night steered east all these twenty
four hours so was

Remarks on board September the 1st 1859

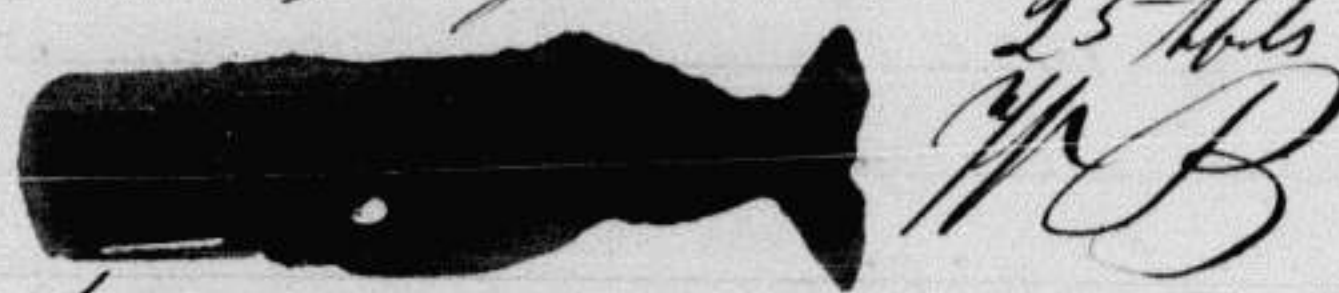
This day commenced with a strong
breeze from the westward and squally weather
let the reef out of the fore topmast
nothing going on worth remark
latitude 37.20 longitude 82.14 saw
grampuses at sundown reefed the

Grampuses seen east then the day
and night so was

Remarks on board Tuesday September the 2nd 1859

This day commenced with a strong breeze
from the westward and squally weather turned the reef
out of the topmast at seven o'clock raised spin
whirls ahead three miles off at eight
bore away for then came the waist boat
struck on the reef of the ship went
to windward then the two boats started the
one while one was then up got the whale
along side at eleven o'clock and commenced
eating got him cut in at half past three
at sundown took in sail came out the water
and commenced heaving latitude 38.56 ship
headed north west then the night later
part squally weather so was Long 87.00



Remarks on board Saturday September the 3rd 1859

This day commenced with a strong breeze
from the westward and squally weather saw
a ship sailing and the Schooner Emerald
of New Haven sailing on eighty knots
whirl latitude 38.56 longitude 87.47
all hands employed on the whale at sun
dinner took in the fore topmast and were
ready to the southward had a strong
breeze then the night at four o'clock got three
heaving and came down so was

Remarks on board Sunday September the 4th 1859

This day commenced with a moderate gale
from west south west and clear weather but
saw two whales to the southward
