Remark on board Monday February the 27<sup>th</sup> 1860

This day commenced with fresh breeze from the eastward and good weather. The mainsail the only employed in necessary ship duty with the fair. At the westward about ten miles off. At about 11.30 we long had saw a sailing Schooner heading to the eastward. Made ship several times during the day at sundown took in the mainsail. Headed to the northward the fore part of the night latter part to the southward had fresh breeze. So ends

Remarks on board Tuesday February the 28<sup>th</sup> 1860

This day commenced with fresh breezes from the eastward and good weather made sail saw a Merchant Ship steering south west under all sail saw five backs of turtles 11.45 to 12.45 6.45 to 6.56 this afternoon blew on strong and aged weather saw a Big steering south west at sundown took in ship blew on strong heading to the northward than the night strong breezes and aged weather 8.30 ends

Remarks on Maria Baneray February the 29<sup>th</sup> 1860

This day eminent with. thing breaks  
from the eastward and rugged vether

Wore ship to the northward. Between 12 & 13  
lengthen 65 & 15 fathoms strong all this  
day. pt. sandbar took in suit one ship  
to the northward had strong breeze there  
the night and squally. Between 15 & 20

Remarks on board Thursday March the 1<sup>st</sup> 1860

This day commenced with a moderate gail  
from the eastward broke out for water and  
from at eight o'clock could the sun seen  
from aloft. Wave in heavy and a heavy  
sea running between 20-35 - longitude 65° 56'  
saw a Merchant Ship steering north west.  
Clear strong all this day, at sundown  
began to moderate a little ship heading  
north by the wind had strong breezes  
thru the night - and raged with in 20 exas

Remarks on board Friday March the 2<sup>nd</sup> 1860

This day commenced with strong breezes from the eastward and ended rather at eight o'clock at the gale and mainsail the watch employed in conveying ships across latitude 13° 23' longitude 66° 58' had strong breezes all the day at random. Let half watches ship heading north by east had strong breezes thru the night 30 ends.

Remains on board Saturday Morn<sup>g</sup> the 3<sup>rd</sup> Oct 1860

This day commenced with strong breezes  
from the southeast and rain fell from  
the sails during the night a severe  
cold caught the men dead from which  
at eight took in the gill and mainsail  
made on to a quail at eleven vessels raised  
Porto Rico where called about 11 24 Brighton  
66.00
