At two o'clock we ship off shore to the southward until the grain blows it down and mends it at five o'clock bent it and set it againe shot sometimes the blow being blown a strong gail throu the night ship headed to the northward So ended

Remarks on board Sunday March the 4th 1860

This day commenced with a gale from the eastward and veered rather over ship to the southward continuing to blow a gale until eleven o'clock when it began to moderate a little at two o'clock at the job and mainsail and raised the main sheet at five o'clock backed ship to the weatherward ran the land about eight miles to the northward of us blow strong then the night So ends

Remarks on board Monday March the 5th 1860

This early mornning with strong breezes from the southeast and raged rather hot. On ship to the northward saw a Merchant Brig sailing to the westward latitude 17.15 longitude 60.03 at the vessel round the great heads were at some considerable time near Spring bridge saw land to the northward of us about twenty miles off at six o'clock looked star offshore to the southward still continues to blow strong at three o'clock looked west to the northward had strong breeze then the night S. wind

Remains in House Tuesday March the 6th 1840

This day commenced with strong breezes from the southeast and raised rather early. At 2 P.M. off the water how at eight o'clock under ship to the station and

Eastward saw a Merchant ship steering to the westward at twelve o'clock blew in stronger gusts in the mainmast and at the bymist at one o'clock one ship to the northward at four o'clock had it more moderate set the mainmast at sundown saw Cook Island. off the weather bow sight miles off saw a Schooner bearing to the southward and eastward heads of shore the fore part of the night latter part in shore had strong breezes threw the night so ends.

Remarks on board Wednesday March the 7th 1860

This day commenced with fresh breezes from the eastward and good weather saw Santa Cruz and St. Thomas to the windward of us tacked the reefs out of the fore top-sail and set the middle star-sail and worked to windward thence St. Thomas we tacked and so forth at sundown got up with in about fifteen miles of the harbor buoyed gave moderate set at sail. have fine weather show the night So ^{you} catch a fish

Remarks on board Thursday March the 5th 1861

This day commenced with five prizes from the Eastward and good weather ran round sail having to the westward got up the gables and beat them and got the anchor off the bar at five o'clock came to anchor at St Thomas but the sails there is about thirty sail of vessels lying here of different nations had five within three the night So came lying at St Thomas

Notes on board Friday March the 9th 1860

This day commenced with fine weather commencing raining
and to take in the provisions a boat was sent yet
it all on board at then calmed yet it all
stove away and washed off deck and so forth
