the southward steered to the northward
and sent sails latter part of the night
the wind had to wind north east and heard
up fresh S. e. wind off Cape Mesa Maria

Remarks on board Sunday April the 5th 1860

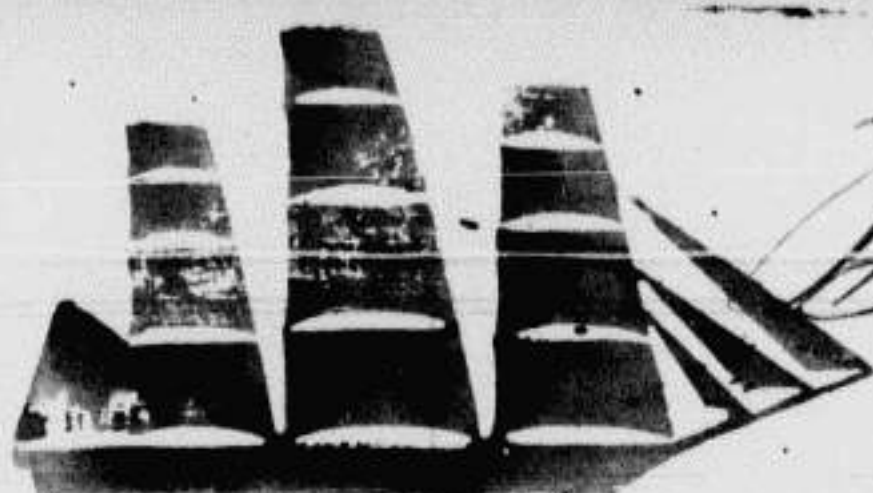
This day commenced with fine breezes
from north east and good weather
in a breeze beating with Port Officer bay
latitude 13° 45' longitude 74° 44' this afternoon
breeze up fresh backed ship several times
during the day at sundown took in sail
sailing to the northward and eastward
had strong breezes the fore part of
the night latter part had it more
moderate S. e. wind in Port Officer bay

Remarks on board Monday April the 9th 1860

Commenced with fresh breezes from the
northward and good weather made sail
and stood on to the eastward no latter
and longitude broke out for water latter part
of the afternoon made on strong backed
ship several times during the day at sundown
took in sail heading to the eastward
latter part of the night had it more
moderate S. e. wind in Port Officer bay

Remarks on board Tuesday April the 10th 1860

Commenced with strong breezes from the
northward and aged weather made
sail and stood to the northward
and westward breeze on stronger at
nine o'clock took in the mainsail



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And set the bysant saw two sails steering
into the bay at eleven o'clock began the
land and main boats for blackfish and
both boats got fast but the land boat
lost her at twelve o'clock came an anchor
and hauled in the fish latitude 19° 36' longitude
73° 29' the watch employed clearing away the
blackfish at sundown took in the jib
heading to the eastward off Cape Mesa Maria
saw three sails to the westward at eight
o'clock backed ship to the northward had
strong breezes thru the night S. e. wind

Remarks on board Wednesday April the 11th 1860

Commenced with strong breezes from
north east and aged weather set the
jib and mainsail and stood on to
the northward broke out for flour and
small steers saw several sails steering to
the westward latitude 20° 35' longitude 74° 10'
at one o'clock backed ship to the eastward
took in the mainsail had it equally at
sundown took in the jib and set
half watches at twelve o'clock backed ship
to the northward set the jib and mainsail
had strong breezes thru the night S. e. wind
off Great Managua

Remarks on board Thursday April the 12th 1860

Commenced with strong breezes from
north east and aged weather backed ship
and stood up for the land saw several sails
lying at anchor at Managua latitude 20° 43'
longitude 74° 55' about the work and held
set the blackfish rose new fore top sail
reathens latter part of the afternoon had
it calm off Great Managua at sundown
