off north saw nothing at sundown
look in suit and left to the wind
head at south east had it rang the latter
part of the night So ends

Remarks on board Saturday April the 24th 1860

Bound by George E. Bradley

Commenced with fresh breezes from
the westward and raged rather at the
jib the watch employed backing out
for water taken 27.53 longitude 78.49
at one o'clock saw the Reef ahead backed
ship and set the mainmast had it
more moderate at half past five o'clock
saw a large ship ahead of the watch
how far miles off. Saw all three
masts and held for her but saw nothing
more of the ship from the Boat or
Ship at dark came on board and
look in suit head at the northward
the fore part of the night latter part
was round to the southward fresh breezes
So ends

Remarks on board Wednesday April the 25th 1860

Commenced with strong breezes from
north east and raged rather at the
jib and mainmast saw a Brig sailing
west the east at nine o'clock saw the
Reef backed ship to the northward the
watch employed in making ship days
taken 27.57 longitude 79.00 had
strong breezes then the day at
sundown took in suit at one o'clock
the wind shifted round to north east
was round to the northward had it
more moderate So ends

Officer's Orders

Remarks on board Thursday April the 26th 1860

Commenced with fresh breezes from
north east and raged rather at
the jib and mainmast at ten o'clock
backed ship to the eastward the watch
employed in making ship days
taken 28.19 longitude 79.20 at
four o'clock backed ship to the
northward saw a Schooner sailing to
the southward at sundown took in
suit heading to the northward
at one o'clock the wind shifted round
to the eastward had fresh breezes
then the night So ends

Remarks on board Friday April the 27th 1860

Commenced with strong breezes from
the eastward and raged rather at
the jib and stood on to the southward
nothing going on with remarking
taken 29.55 longitude 79.05 at two
o'clock took in the jib and were ship
to the northward stood on to a gail
at sundown took in the foremast
and had down the hatches heading
north north east at one o'clock
commenced the rain the wind shifted round
to the southward and blew in heavy
So ends

Remarks on board Saturday April the 28th 1860

Commenced with a gail from the
southward and a heavy sea running at
nine o'clock stood away the foremast
took in in and lay under the staysails
and try sail at eleven o'clock cleared
