Clear off but continue to blow heavy
latitude 28° 20' longitude 75° 42' at four
o'clock began to moderate a little
but still blow strong and a heavy
sea running at one o'clock the wind hauled
round to the westward and ship to the
northward latter part of the night blow
in to a gail again So ends

Remarks on board Sunday April the 29th 1860

Commenced with a gail from north
west and raged rather trying to heading
to the northward latitude 28° 18' longitude 75° 42'
continue to blow a gail then
the day and a heavy sea running at
seven o'clock began to moderate a little
at nine o'clock blow in again heavy had
a heavy sea running latter part still blowing
heavy So ends

Remarks on board Monday April the 30th 1860

Commenced with strong gails from north
west and a heavy sea running at seven
o'clock shifted a sea and blow the main
boat and carried away the barrow got
up tacks and took the main boat in on
deck saw a Brig heading to the northward
and eastward latitude 28° 20' longitude 75° 42'
continue to blow heavy all this day saw
a large Brig steering north east under
close reef topsails at sundown began
to moderate some headed north east
threw the night So ends



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Remarks on board Tuesday May the 1st 1860

Commenced with strong breezes from north
west and a heavy sea running high at
four o'clock and provisions were still heading
west commenced repairing the main
boat latitude 28° 42' longitude 75° 48' at
three o'clock lost the foremast and set
it had it more moderate at four o'clock
got the boat aboard and got her in the
cabin saw a Barque steering south east
under topsails at sundown had good
weather excepting a heavy swell running from
the northward had light breezes then the
night headed south west by west So ends

Remarks on board Wednesday May the 2nd 1860

Commenced with light breezes from the
northward and good weather excepting a
heavy swell running in the jib and commenced
brushing out for the fore sail and bread
dred part of the ends of oil barrel then
latitude 28° 28' longitude 76° 05' at
sundown got close off her the fore
sail and sand can took in the jib had
it earn headed to the westward then the
day at night o'clock got a light breeze
from the northward headed to the
westward then the night So ends

Remarks on board Thursday May the 3rd 1860

Commenced with fresh breezes from the
northward and fair weather made sail
and stood on for the westward the watch
employed watering in the morning saw
a Barque steering to the eastward
under all sail latitude 28° 21' longitude 76° 44'
