Being hole at sundown took in
heaving north then the night So
ends

Remarks on board Sunday May the 13th 1860

Commenced with fine breeze from the
eastward and thick cloudy weather made
sail and lashed ship to the southward at
seven o'clock stand off some latitude 23° 00'
longitude 79° 55' This after noon the
wind hauled round to north east and
a sail showing to the southward at
sundown took in sail heading east
south east at night about one o'clock
to the northward had light breeze thru
the night So ends

Remarks on board Monday May the 14th 1860

Commenced with light breeze from
north east and fair weather made sail
and steered south east at six o'clock
and the reef lashed ship to the northward
and westward had a strong current
setting to south west nothing going
in more than ordinary ship's duty
latitude 24° 32' longitude 79° 45' At
noon three gulls steering distant courses
saw black fish and porpoise at sundown
took in the light sails and reef
the foremast had light breeze thru
the night So ends

Remarks on board Tuesday May the 15th 1860

Commenced with light breeze from
the westward and fine weather set all
sail and steered north west the watch
employed in ordinary ship's duty saw

Three sails showing to the eastward
latitude 25° 12' longitude 79° 30' At
eight o'clock were taken and steered south
by east saw grampies at sundown
took in sail had it warm but the heat
of the night got a light breeze from
the southward So ends

Remarks on board Wednesday May the 16th 1860

Commenced with light breeze from the
southward and fine weather made sail and
stood on to the eastward the watch employed
in ordinary ship's duty at seven o'clock
had a heavy squall came up every thing well
but no sail hauled and so forth at one
o'clock the squall past over and stand
off had fine breeze from the eastward
made sail again and steered to the northward
and eastward saw one sail steering to
the northward saw grampies at sundown
took in sail hauled to the northward the
fore part of the night latter part to
the southward So ends

Remarks on board Thursday May the 17th 1860

Commenced with fine breeze from the
eastward and good weather made sail
and stood on to the southward the watch
employed in ordinary ship's duty latitude
26° 03' longitude 79° 53' At
two o'clock split the jib part of
it in and commenced mending it at four
o'clock lashed ship to the northward at
sundown got the jib finished and took
in sail heading north north east
latter part of the night had it warm
so ends there twenty four hours
